KUBLI TO OPEN UP CAMPAIGN AT OLD HOME, JACKSONVILLE

According to the Sunday Oregonian, K. K. Kubli of Portland, will open his campaign for the United States senate with a speech in Jacksonville, date yet undecided. The why of the speech is thus explained:

Largely a matter of sentiment is the reason advanced by Kubli for deciding to make his first public speech for the senatorial nomination from the front steps of the old Kubli home in Jacksonville. Born in Jackson county and widely known there, Kubli wants

to deliver his keynote address to the men and women with whom he went to school.

It was in Jacksonville where Kubli practiced law and was also first baseman of the Jacksonville team.

"The speech will be one of the 'first guns of the campaign.'"

Kubli in his statement January 1st, announcing his intention of being a candidate, declared for "economy and the upholding of the Oregon Compulsory school law."
