A husband and wife who own their own home are more apt to save. They have an interest in the advancement of a social system that permits the individual to store up the fruits of his labor. As direct taxpayers they take a more active part in local government. Above all, the love of home is one of the finest instincts and the greatest of inspirations of our people."

\$100 DOWN GIVES YOU A CITY LOT UPON PAVEMENT

One hundred dollars down and the balance in fourteen semi-annual payments with interest at six per cent on deferred payments, are the terms under which the lots owned by the city will be sold during "Home Building Campaign" of the Medford Chamber of Commerce. The sale takes place on Wednesday. The sale price of the lots are the assessments against them, which is the amount the city assumed in order to protect itself for the bonded indebtedness for paving and other improvements.

A city map showing the location of all lots offered at the sale has been prepared and may be seen at the office of the chamber. In order that buyers may have an opportunity to view the lots arrangements have been made to place a sign on those lots offered for sale.

The committee in charge of the campaign are C. E. Gates, chairman, T. W. Miles and W. H. Crawford. The members of the Jackson County Realty Board cooperating. More than fifty members of the Chamber of Commerce have been appointed as members of the sales committee and they met this afternoon for instructions.

Medford it is believed, faces the most prosperous year in her history in the construction of new business blocks and residences. In 1923 the building permits amounted to \$408,295.00, whereas building permits issued in January and February of this year already amount to \$274,474.00.

With the thousands of tourists coming within a short time, and about ten per cent being prospects as permanent residents and with a shortage of residences at the present time, there must be more homes built if the new comer is to be given an opportunity to remain here. Many prospects left Medford last year because of a shortage of houses and at least two hundred new ones ought to be built as soon as possible. No class of men realize more than the real estate dealers the problem that confronts the Pacific northwest. Thousands of prospective residents are on their way to Oregon and to see that they get a square deal has been the responsibility assumed by the real estate men. To this end a Realty Board has been formed in Jackson county and the officers of their Northwest Association will be in Medford to confer with the realtors here and they will be guests at the forum of the Medford Chamber of Commerce where they will be given a general outline of how an effort to care for the home-seekers is being made.

The following officers of the Northwest Real Estate Association will attend the forum: F. S. Barrett, president, of Spokane; John H. Mariels, vice president, of Portland; and T. W. Zimmerman, secretary, of Portland. Will Moore, real estate commissioner for Oregon, will accompany the delegation.

DENIES SITUATION IN CALIF. UNDER CONTROL

OLYMPIA, Wash., March 3.—Reports that the foot and mouth disease situation in California is under control were denied by Dr. L. C. Pelton, state veterinarian, in a telegram received by Director E. L. French of the department of agriculture this morning. Dr. Pelton now is in Oakland investigating the spread of the disease for the state of Washington.

Dr. Pelton advised Mr. French to stand pat on the livestock quarantine with the possible exception of admitting baby chicks. He will submit a report on baby chicks later.
