

BILL ULRICH GETS A WRITE UP IN SUNDAY JOURNAL

The Portland Sunday Journal printed a picture of William Ulrich of Medford and a sketch of his career of which the following is a part:

William Ulrich, democratic candidate for county judge of Jackson county, was born in Burlington, Iowa, in 1855, crossed the plains with his parents by ox team in 1860 and arrived in Jacksonville, Ore., in the fall of the same year. There were 60 wagons in this train and in were such old pioneers as the Barneburgs, Parrys, Lavenburgs, Nortons, Youngs and others. Ulrich's father died in 1869. He was forced to work for his board and keep on the farm of Lyman Chappelle on the Applegate, where he worked for two years. He then hired out to Chappelle for four years at \$20 per month and board and saved out of that small salary \$16 per month. After the expiration of this term Ulrich came back to Jacksonville and learned the baker's trade, at which he worked for several years. He sold this business and moved to Medford where the railroad came to the Rogue River valley, where he built the third business house in Medford.

BONUS IN FORM OF INSURANCE IS URGED BY SOLONS

WASHINGTON, March 2.—Proposals to make soldier bonus payments in the form of paid-up insurance led to several arguments today at the opening of public hearings by the house ways and means committee today on adjusted compensation legislation.

Representative Andrew, republican, Massachusetts explained to the committee a measure he has introduced providing for insurance with an option of cash payments for those veterans not entitled to more than \$50.

"The veterans' need for cash is not the same now as at the close of the war, insurance provision appeals to me as better for the veterans, granting them protection against worry for the future."

Mr. Andrew estimated the bill would not cost more than the measure passed last session.

Representative Fish, republican, New York, presented his bonus scheme of restricting all payments to a twenty-year endowment policy. It would allow policies of \$400 for each six months of service above sixty days, with a minimum of \$1000 and would allow \$800 to beneficiaries of each of the 5000 who died during the war without insurance.

Such a measure would cost \$2,000,000,000 or about \$100,000,000 a year, Mr. Fish estimated. All veterans, including officers up to the rank of captain in the army and marine corps and lieutenant in the navy would be eligible.

Both Mr. Andrew and Representative Cole, republican, Iowa, declared they had never heard opposition to a bonus expressed by any enlisted man.

MINISTER SCORES CHURCH METHODS

CHICAGO, March 2.—"Some people are treating the church like a vault for the safekeeping of old relics," Dr. Hugh Black of New York City, declared last night in addressing the Sunday Evening club.

"These precious old truths are carefully guarded by the elders who become sort of watchdogs and do a great deal of barking, most of it up the wrong tree," Dr. Black said. "Others would make the church a sort of love feast with no backbone, just a slush of sentiment bleating about peace where there is no peace and offering no practical program for the obtaining of peace."

The present difference in the church cannot be adjusted by a uniform creed. It would be a case of the lion and the lamb lying down together—with the lamb inside. The church can co-operate by having a common purpose to advance justice and right."

MAYOR BAKER OF PORTLAND TALKS ON AID TO CHILDREN

Mayor George Baker of Portland addressed the Kiwanis club at their luncheon in the Hotel Medford at noon today and paid a high tribute to the "Underprivileged Child Movement" being conducted by Kiwanis clubs all over the state.

The mayor opened his remarks by complimenting the work being done in this state and nation by the Rotary and Kiwanis clubs and said no higher class of orders exist.

Mayor Baker said he has the honor of being chairman of the board of directors of the crippled children's hospital in Portland, which is one of the eleven institutions started and maintained by the Shrine. The institution in Portland has a capacity of 50 children. There are 28 in the home now and applications accepted for the other 12. They accept crippled children under the age of 14 who are curable.

"The most important work before the American people today," said the mayor, "is giving more serious thought to boys' and girls' life and furnishing them better conditions and environments."

"There is not enough thought given by the parents to their children today. In fact the parents are more responsible than the children for so much child delinquency and nowhere is this more evident than in a large city like Portland. Seventy-five per cent of the crime in that community is committed by youths under 24 years of age and the parents are responsible for most of it. It is high time for them to wake up to this fact."

"I want to call your attention to the fact that there are very few Protestant institutions for the children in this country or state. The Corvallis farm home is one that is worthy of support. It is being aided by the O. A. C. and will do a grand work."

The mayor closed by telling of the movement being made to establish in Los Angeles by the Chambers of Commerce and different clubs to inform the thousands of tourists who visit there of the wonders of Oregon and its advantages for home-seekers and said every one should boost for this movement.

J. J. Buchter received the honors today and the hotel served canned chicken, put up by the Rogue River Canning company, also their canned peas and beans.

C. M. Kidd was appointed chairman of the charity ball committee and is to select the other members.

Superintendent A. G. Smith said they are endeavoring to secure 125 people to attend the basketball game at Roseburg Friday evening in order to secure a special train on the Southern Pacific. The fare to be \$6.25 for the round trip, train to leave here at 1 p. m. and return after the game.

The Greater Medford club sent an invitation for Kiwanians to attend the lecture at the public library the evening of March 17, by Mrs. G. J. Frankie of Portland on the "White Cross." Guests were Mayor George Baker, S. R. Johnson, superintendent of the Chiloquin Lumber company; H. C. Mesner, a lumberman of Klamath Falls and F. H. Velo of New York.

MERCHANTS AGREE NOT TO SELL OLEO IN TILLAMOOK

TILLAMOOK, Ore., March 2.—Substitutes for dairy butter will find a difficult market in Tillamook county hereafter. The business men of the county have agreed with each other and with the dairymen of the county not to handle, sell or advertise any of the substitutes for dairy butter.

This is the first move on the part of dairymen of the state in their fight against oleomargarine. According to dairymen of the county who were active in securing the agreement between the merchants and dairymen, the state Dairymen's Association meeting at Hillsboro on February 27 and 28 will take up the fight against butter substitutes in an effort to stimulate the use of dairy butter.

The agreement made here was signed by every dealer handling butter or butter substitutes and by the majority of the newspapers in the county, and by Rollie W. Watson, representative from Tillamook county at the state legislature.

In addition to agreeing not to sell the butter substitutes, the business men contradicted the statements generally made that Tillamook people demand the sale of Oleo-margarine.

VANDERLIP SNUBBED BY PREST. COOLIDGE

WASHINGTON, March 3.—White House officials said today that President Coolidge did not care to dignify by comment the declaration of Frank A. Vanderlip yesterday that the president had asked but not received the resignation of Attorney-General Daugherty.

WHAT OUR GIRLS SHOULD BE IS SERMON TOPIC

The Girl Reserves, according to their program, attended services in a body Sunday morning at the First Baptist church. A full section of news was reserved for them. As the large and representative body of Medford girls entered the auditorium they sang their official song, the audience standing while they were being seated.

Much appreciation was expressed of the practical sermon especially delivered for them by Rev. F. R. Leach, pastor of the church. The choir had some splendid music.

Rev. Mr. Leach spoke on "What Our Girls Should Be." How the ideals of the Girl Reserves help girls to meet the temptations of their sex and to solve their problems was mentioned in the speaker's introduction. The girl of today, said the speaker, lives in a different world from the girl of yesterday; she touches life in all its phases; is in the world of business, and is under greater strain and temptations; she belongs to more organizations; attends more dances; takes more joy rides, and smokes more cigarettes and drinks more booze. It is her right to belong to the so-called smart set.

The girl of today has greater advantages than the girl of yesterday; is more educated; knows more of life, but for all this she is a better girl; is she making a better wife and mother; is she better morally, physically and spiritually?

The world is in need today of the old-fashioned girl; the girl who thinks more of shining in the home than in society; who is interested in something aside from the latest dance and jazz music or novel; who keeps her fingers at wrong and false standards and vulgar fashion; who is sweet, high minded, a lover of home and church, and one who can say her prayers and is not afraid of standing alone, if need be.

What should our girls be? They should be attractive and beautiful. There is beauty of form. There is a power for good, if the girl can be beautiful and not self-conscious of it. When she is then she loses the charm of real beauty. Beauty does not come from use of cosmetic paint and powder detract rather than attract. Beauty of dress is also desirable, but should not be the only thought of the girl.

The average girl of today gives too much time and thought to her dress, and thinks more of what she has on her head than what she has in it. Beauty of mind is also essential. It serves to make the face attractive where a lack of education interferes with one's power for good. Beauty of manners should also be considered by girls. Coarse, vulgar manners are unbecoming in a girl. Above all beauty of character should be placed foremost. For without character a girl is a drug on the market. No girl is really beautiful who has an impure heart. Beauty of soul is essential to perfect womanhood.

Our girls should be serviceable. The girl of today is not as useful in the home as she once was. Every girl should have some home duties and not feel she is above work. She should know the art of cooking, and be a home maker above all things. Our girls should be practical, physically strong and thus well equipped to exert the great power women have on the other sex, and on the generation of tomorrow. The world will give place to this girl who can make good, but to make good she must be good. God pity the girl who only has beauty of face and dress, and has no beauty of character, mind or soul. Here is a wasted life.

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R. G. FOWLER TO SUCCEED CLUB LEADER, L. MOSS

The Lewis county agent, Robert G. Fowler, has tendered his resignation to the county commissioners, effective April 1. Fowler has been county agent for three years. He will go to Jackson county, Oregon, making his home in Medford. His work there will be of similar nature, excepting that his time will be devoted particularly to livestock. A more attractive salary is responsible for his going to Oregon.
