**Paderewski Is  
Statesman, Orator  
And Musician**

Paderewski who is to appear in Medford, March 18, has gained a world wide reputation as statesman, orator and musician.

It is generally thought that musicians, writers, and artists have no ability outside of their own particular line. There are many examples, however, to disprove this belief. One of the most notable of these is Paderewski.

When this pianist became famous some twenty years ago, he was pictured and cartooned with his "hayrick head of hair" as Kipling would call it. It however, requires great occasions to bring out great men. There was not a conspicuous figure in the world war who, perhaps, accomplished as much or did it as thoroughly as did this same long haired pianist.

In 1915-17 he made speeches all over this country and in Europe. In 1917 he gave a series of concerts here and cleared \$147,000 for the cause of Poland.

On his return to New York where he was to give a concert in Carnegie

hall, President Wilson called upon Paderewski to furnish him a memorandum embodying plans and data regarding Poland and a proposed independent government. After this nerve-racking repital he returned to his hotel and kept two typists busy until midnight, the following day he slept two hours and then completed the work by four o'clock, an almost continuous stretch of 32 hours.

But the memorandum got off to Washington Thursday morning as promised and was the means of influencing President Wilson to call for "a free and independent Poland" in his "Fourteen Points."

Paderewski is a great orator as well as a great pianist and the Andrews Brothers are going to try and induce him to give a little talk in addition to his concert.
