

MEDFORD BOY AT O. A. C. EXTOLS THE MARVELS OF CITY

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, March—The advantages of Medford, the biggest little city in Oregon, were stressed by Russell Hibbard, Medford high school student, at the "Sell Oregon" extemporaneous speaking contest in connection with the O. A. C. educational exposition.

"Two of Medford's greatest resources are timber and fruit raising," said Hibbard. "Standing timber in Jackson county amounts to 125,000,000 board feet with the best of roads leading to it.

"The Rogue river and its tributaries furnish 200,000 horsepower for electric power. A large electric plant has been constructed at Prospect. One half million dollars has already been spent on an irrigation project for a canal in the Cascade district.

"Medford is progressing with 'progress' as their motto. The people of Medford are hospitable, and the type of people among whom one enjoys living."

PRUNE GROWERS PLAN A NORTHWEST POOL

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 6.—Fruit growers of the Dundee section yesterday afternoon laid before an informal gathering of prune men here a proposal to pool the prunes of all of the producing sections of the northwest with a single selling agency.

The plan is to have the growers in the various sections organize local associations, pool their crops and have the selling agency pro rate the orders among the several associations.

The proposal is being taken under consideration by the local and state associations now functioning, but is meeting with considerable opposition from the Oregon Growers Association, the Dundee Association and the Washington Grower Association, which are advancing an organization to establish prices while leaving the sales work in the hands of the existing sales organizations.
