PREST. COOLIDGE TO DRAW NAME FOR DAVIS CUP

NEW YORK, Mar. 7.—Promotion of the Davis cup tennis matches was characterized as a service in behalf of national unity, in a letter from President Coolidge to Assistant Secretary of War Dwight B. Davis, donor of the Davis cup. The letter was made public today.

The international tournament becomes an occasion for establishment of better acquaintance throughout the world and for setting up a fine standard of sport which will set an example in every other field of human activity, the president said. His letter continues:

"Whatever tends to promote interest in clean, vigorous athletics, is altogether to the advancement of public morale. Good health, straight thinking and clean morals are all to be gained through the arousal of interest in the right kind of sport."

Mr. Coolidge said he would gladly accept the invitation to draw the first name for the international matches and suggested the selections be made at the White House March 17.

DOWNTOWN PARKING OF AUTOMOBILES IN CITIES MUST STOP

ST. LOUIS, March 7.—Downtown parking of automobiles must be abolished, building of skyscrapers limited and \$170,000,000 raised yearly for extensions of electric railways in order to relieve traffic congestions in large cities of the United States, transportation experts representing municipalities and electric railways disclosed at the mid-year meeting of the American Electric Railway association here today.

Parking was vigorously attacked by five traffic experts led by Harland Bartholomew, city plan engineer of St. Louis.

President Britton L. Hudd of the association declared that street car riders would soon revolt against the small minority who travel in automobiles taking precedence over them in the use of street space.

CLEVELAND SUFFERS CITY WATER FAMINE

CLEVELAND, March 7.—Virtually all of Greater Cleveland depended on springs and the distribution of distilled water for their drinking and cooking supplies today. "This situation, one of the most acute in the city's history, was brought about by the strong taste of phenol and chlorine in the water pumped from Lake Erie."

Hundreds of Clevelanders stood for hours awaiting their turn at seven approved springs. They were armed with jugs, bottles, pitchers, pails and even wash tubs. So great was the crowd that police were stationed at the springs to see that each person left after obtaining a gallon of water so that the next in line could move up.

THEATRE STRIKE IN N. Y. LOOKS CERTAIN

NEW YORK, March 7.—Negotiations between the Actors' Equity association and the Producing Managers' association have reached a deadlock over the issue of the Equity's demand for an all-Equity shop and a theatrical strike June 1 appears certain.

Spokesmen for both organizations yesterday said there would be no compromise on the main issue. A statement signed by 27 producing managers declared working of the Equity shops would do "enduring harm to art in the theater and be humiliating, unjust and un-American."

EX-KAISER PUTTING IN HIS SPRING GARDEN

DOORN, Holland, Mar. 7.—The former German emperor is curtailing his wood cutting activities and has started making ready his yard and garden for spring. Nearly every day recently he has worked among the rose bushes and other shrubbery on his estate near here.

Other improvements on the place include the alteration of the old conservatory, which because of a shortage of rooms in the house, is to be converted into a nursery for the children of Princess Herminie, who have made their home here since the ex-kaiser's second marriage.

England to Drop Singapore
LONDON, March 6.—A committee which has been investigating the proposal for a naval base at Singapore has reported to the cabinet and there is good reason for stating that the government has decided to drop the subject, says the Daily Mail.

REED TURNS HIS VIALS OF WRATH ON MO. ENEMIES

MEXICO, Mo., March 5.—United States Senator James A. Reed, candidate for the democratic presidential nomination, in a speech here last night, departed from his usual custom of ignoring questions submitted by his Missouri democratic opponents and replied to an anonymous circular distributed at the meeting.

"These cowards who dare not sign their names," Reed replied, "ask me if Missouri gives you the delegation to the national convention, and you cannot get the nomination, to whom will you throw your support, William Randolph Hearst, or Al Smith?"

"If Missouri's delegation go to the national convention instructed for me," Reed said, "it will vote for me to the last ballot and I expect to be nominated on that ballot."

"They also ask me," continued Reed: "Did I oppose the federal reserve law? No, I made it. It came from the president a poor weak thing. We amended it 581 times."

Reed denounced Herbert Hoover, now secretary of commerce, food administrator during the war, who Reed charged "came from England to rob the farmers of the United States through the war time food control bill."

DEMOCRATS MAY GET LEVIATHAN JOY RIDE

NEW YORK, March 7.—Officials of the United States lines are considering a suggestion that the Leviathan be placed at the disposal of delegates to the democratic national convention for a week end excursion at the conclusion of the convention.

The Leviathan will be in port during convention week. Arrangements would be similar to those of the trial trip of the giant liner last June. Provisions would be made for 2000 passengers.

HOT SPRINGS, Ark., March 6.—Babe Ruth, mighty baseball slugger, winner in a fight against influenza, will leave Sunday to report to the Yankees' training camp in New Orleans to resume his spring limbering up, it was announced today.

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Birth Rate in England Drops; Also Death Rate

LONDON, March 7.—The birth rate is decreasing in Britain, but the country's population problem with which unemployment is linked, is getting worse because people seem to live longer than they used to.

Last year the birth rate was 19.7 per thousand, the lowest on record, except during the last stages of the war, but the death rate simultaneously decreased to 11.6, the healthiest yet achieved, 69 per thousand, compared with 77 in 1922. There were 758,386 births in England and Wales, and 444,869 deaths, a natural increase in population of 313,517.

The marriage rate in England and Wales during 1922 was 15.2 per thousand.

TURKISH CALIPH NOW EN ROUTE TO SWITZERLAND

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 7.—(By the Associated Press)—Abdul Mejid Effendi, the caliph, head of the Mussulmans' expelled from Turkey by order of the Turkish national assembly at Angora, left Constantinople today for exile in Switzerland.

The caliph boarded a special train with the immediate members of his entourage a few hours after the assembly had passed a measure for his deposition and the abolition of the caliphate.

The deposed caliph, Crown Prince Abdul Mejid Effendi, cousin of Sultan Mohammed VI, is 52 years old and was elected caliph in November, 1922, by the grand national assembly at Angora.
