13 MILLIONS LOANED OREGON SERVICE MEN

Colonel Wm. A. Aird, special agent for the state bonus commission, was in Medford today on business. He says there are 13 millions of dollars loaned in Oregon to the ex-service men, \$267,000 of which is in Jackson county, with 117 loans, mostly on city property. There has been \$11,260 paid back to the state by the boys in this county and there has only been one delinquency. This is one of the best records in the state and is a high compliment to the personal of the boys.

Mr. Aird also paid a splendid compliment to the loan committee, R. P. Cowgill, E. M. White and Vernon Vawter and Attorney W. M. Briggs, and said there is a mistaken idea about the expiration time of application for loans. The boys who have made the initial application have until June, 1927, to complete their application.

Colonel Aird commended the 248th machine gun squadron in the 91st famous Wild West division. It has a distinguished service cross issued by the United States, a Croix de Guerra issued by the French government and two British medals of honor.
