Captain Ted R. Jackman of the Salvation Army headquarters in Los Angeles arrived in Medford today to take charge of the post in Medford and the vicinity, which has been without a captain for four weeks since the departure of Ensign H. Rogers for Denver.

Captain Jackman's welcoming ser-

vice will take place Sunday evening and services will be conducted Saturday as usual.

When It Cost More to Run a Grocery Store Than a Saloon

Interesting Facts and Figures Taken From Old Jacksonville Record.

Yesteryears in Jackson county governmental affairs were slightly different from today, the "Commissioners' Journal," before the Civil war reveals. The musty, age faded records in the county courthouse archives, also show that social conditions have changed.

For the year ending June 30, 1862, the entire cost of operating the county amounted to \$13,286.41, slightly in excess of the amount expended in 1923 for prohibition enforcement. Road work for the same period cost \$493.24. This expenditure also included bridge work. In 1923, a recent report shows, roads hereabouts cost \$304,190.68.

At the same meeting of the county court, a man paid \$15 for a license to "sell spirituous liquors in quantities of less than one quart, for a year," and Julius Baum of Yreka, Calif., paid \$45 for a license to operate a grocery store in Jacksonville.

On August 16, 1862, John Ndeber of Jacksonville, filed a bond of \$20,000 as county treasurer, and the county

court told the sheriff to stop the practice of "rowdies shooting at tin cans, in the residence district." The same day the sheriff was allowed a bill of \$1 for a new bridle buckle.

The outstanding warrants of the county, the treasurer reported in October amounted to \$3,286.41. Three prisoners were in the county jail, one being a Chinaman by the name of Lee Wah.

The "Commissioners' Journal" in 1861 contains several indentures for the "bouncing out of children," to families with names familiar in the present day life of Jackson county. Most of the children involved were orphans, and it was an accepted way of caring for waifs in those days.

The boy or girl thus cared for was applied for by his guardian, and the county court gave its approval, the same being recorded in longhand, in legal phraseology.

The child agreed to "serve until the age of 21, as an apprentice in whatever occupation his master may in his

wisdom assign him, to keep his master's secret, to toil industriously and faithfully without complaint, to obey, and be of a glad heart, in all things at all times."

In exchange for this "the master," agreed "to clothe and feed and care for in health and in sickness, in sunshine and storm, to brighten and lighten the path of the days, and learn the charge to read and cipher, if said charge be mentally capable thereof."

"And, it is further agreed that when said charge has reached the age of 21 years, he is free to go whither they will."

If the charge was a boy, when the leavetaking time arrived, "the master" agreed "to furnish him one horse, one saddle, one blanket, and one good suit of new clothes." Some "masters" went farther and agreed to give "\$125 or the equivalent thereof."

If the charge was a girl, she went forth into the world with "sufficient clothing, and one feather bed and bedding."

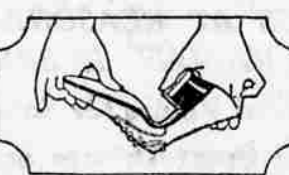
