REDUCTION of TAXATION ISSUE IS LAID SQUARELY BEFORE PUBLIC

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THERE can be no doubt that Secretary of the Treasury Mellon's recommendation to Acting Chairman Green of the House Ways and Means Committee that the next Congress make a general downward revision of taxes has struck a responsive chord throughout the country. It is concrete evidence, the kind that can be understood in every American home, that after a disastrous world war, the United States have passed the critical period of readjustment.

The approach to normal conditions has not been opened without a considerable effort, however, and it will be well for a citizenry, encouraged by Secretary Mellon's statement, to keep this in mind. The surplus of receipts over expenditures which has resulted at the close of each year since the war ended, was made possible only by a program of economy in the conduct of public business. This program received definition in and an impulse from a new budgetary system which became operative in 1921. Administrative requirements were reduced to a minimum and constant pressure was exerted to anticipate tendencies on the part of Congress to return to the former system of ill-considered, extravagant appropriations. A revolutionary change in the attitude of administrative departments toward the expenditure of the public moneys was effected and Congress, on the whole, was diligent in cooperation. Mr. Mellon's recommendations are based upon the assumption that this attitude on the part of the executive and legislative branches will continue.

The issue between this new method of conducting public affairs and the old system is now laid before the people for their

consideration. Through their representatives in Congress they must now decide whether they prefer general reduction in Federal taxation or whether they prefer that the lid so tightly clamped down on Government expenditures during the last three years shall be lifted. Either the program of economy and efficiency in Government affairs must be continued or the proposal to reduce taxes to any appreciable extent must be given

As an economic problem the present proposal to reduce taxes can be readily understood. It is estimated that taxes collected during the year 1923 upon the business of the year 1924 will yield revenues in excess of expenditures to the extent of \$332,000,000. This is the margin within which tax reductions may be made and this margin will be reduced dollar for dollar in the proportion that expenditures not now contemplated by the Government are authorized by Congress.

Compared with the total of expenditures this margin is not large. Guaged, however, by the benefits, direct and indirect, which a reduction in taxes to that amount would bring to more than 14,000,000 taxpayers, it is an enormous sum. Relief from payments to the Government is but a part of the benefit thus to be conferred. Of vastly greater importance in the long run would be the fulfillment of Secretary Mellon's prediction that easement in taxes will bring an increase of funds available for investment in productive industries. Such an outcome would mean not only more income for persons employed but a reduction in the costs of the necessities of life upon which those incomes are expended.

DEPT. OF JUSTICE REFUSES TO GIVE SUSPECT'S NAME

WASHINGTON, March 8.—The department of justice declined today to disclose the name of the two representatives referred to in the Chicago grand jury report.

Attorney General Daugherty offered, however, to transmit to the house, in response to its request, evidence said to indicate improper use of influence for a consideration, developed in Chicago.

Mr. Daugherty took the position he could not disclose the identity of the two representatives as asked in the house resolution until the department had an opportunity to more carefully go into the charges against them.

He offered to withhold further action by the department in the case to enable a house committee to examine the evidence and develop the truth of the charges.

Representative Longworth immediately moved that the communication be referred to the judiciary committee with instructions to report immediately with regard to a course of procedure.

Before the house could act on the Longworth motion, Representative Zihlman, republican, Maryland, who has been mentioned in connection with the charges, took the floor to defend his name.

A few moments later the house adopted the Longworth motion.

SENATOR REED REPUDIATED BY MO. DEMOCRATS

ST. LOUIS, March 8.—Reports received here today from ward and township mass meetings held throughout Missouri, excepting St. Louis, indicate the probable defeat of Senator James A. Reed, who seeks endorsement of the democratic state convention for the presidential nomination.

The majority, according to reports here were not instructed, but were hostile to Reed. In some townships resolutions were adopted instructing the delegates not to vote for Reed but otherwise leaving them uninstructed.

At the meetings delegates were chosen for the county democratic meeting today at which delegates to the state convention at Springfield on April 15 are being selected. Reed had made a speaking campaign of the state in an effort to get instructed delegates for himself in his candidacy for the democratic presidential nomination. Reports showed that while the greater number of the delegates were anti-Reed men, they were not instructed for W. G. McAdoo. They were chiefly instructed.

ST. LOUIS, March 8.—(By the Associated Press.)—Ed A. Glenn, state manager for United States Senator James A. Reed, today stated reports from yesterday's township and ward meetings showed the senator was defeated in all parts of the state except Kansas City and St. Louis. "As far as I'm concerned," he said, "I'm willing to throw up the sponge."
