

## MOSLEM WORLD RALLIES AROUND DEPOSED CALIPH

LONDON, Mar. 8.—The Egyptian Ulemas (Mohammedan wise men) have issued a manifesto to the Moslem world, says the Morning Post's Cairo correspondent, declaring the deposition of the caliph at Constantinople an illegal act by persons who have no voice in the matter and urging the Moslems to hasten the assembly of a congress to settle the question of the caliphate. It was learned.

The Ulemas affirm that the existence of the caliphate is as necessary to every true believer as reason to man in general. They beg the Moslems to defend the caliphate and see that the settlement of the question does not weaken the prestige of Islam but also warn the faithful against taking any action before the meeting of the proposed congress.

The Daily Telegraph has received a dispatch from Jerusalem declaring it is said that the Arabs of Palestine and Syria will join in the proclamation of King Hussein of the Hedjaz as caliph in the next few days and that great celebrations are being prepared. A conference of the Arab states will open at Kuwait on March 15 when it is likely Hussein will be formally proclaimed caliph of the Moslems of the whole Arabian peninsula.

The body of Jacob Baurle, 75, was found by his daughter, Mrs. W. F. Frazer, when she entered his bedroom at 8 a. m. to awaken the aged man. Baurle had suffered a stroke of paralysis yesterday.

EUGENE, Ore., March 8.—James Palmer, 17, of Cottage Grove, charged with second degree murder, will go on trial in circuit court here Wednesday morning, according to District Attorney Johnston.

The charge against Palmer grows out of the fatal stabbing of Ralph Janmeyer at Cottage Grove on the night of January 10.

ROSEBURG, Ore., March 8.—Charles Cummings of Tillamook received a broken collar bone and his wife was badly bruised, when the car in which they were driving to Marshfield upset on the highway near Wilbur. They had just passed a truck loaded with broomstick and in swinging back to the right side of the road turned too rapidly, the car swinging into the bank.

disallowed by the referee. Allen threw two fouls, and the score was 12 to 10 in favor of Medford. Knips and Singleton in a mix-up, had a double foul called. Knips gained his point but Singleton fouled. What Knips did was not announced, but Singleton pulled Knips' hair. With five minutes to go, the Roseburg players fought like demons. The referee was not too particular, but barred tackling. In the closing minutes, with victory in their grasp, Medford played a fast stalling game. Then came the closing shots, and great excitement.

Rapp, star guard of the Roseburg team, and their chief pointmaker, was taken out of the game on four personal fouls. Personal fouls were called on Allen and Knips. Billie Burr, the sensational forward of Roseburg threw but one field goal, due to the guarding of Williams, and was helpless throughout the battle. In the last half Burr was shifted to center, to give him a better chance to display his basket shooting talents, and was held firmly in check by Allen, who played a heady, clever and fast game throughout, getting the jump on the opposing center a large percentage of the time.

Reichstein, Medford guard, went like a wild man in the second half, and by daredevil dashes on the tip-off, snatched the ball in mid-air and started rally after rally. Referee Hagar was hustled all thru the final period getting out of the road of Reichstein, who played with an utter disregard for physical consequences. Incidentally, the activities of the young man cooled the Roseburg ardor for rough stuff. Williams was nearly jammed through the concrete wall in the fierceness of the play.

Chaastain, pivot of the local team was closely guarded, and this with an off night in throwing, resulted in him confining his work to clever floor work. Chaastain threw one basket.

The Roseburg gymnasium was far too small to accommodate the crowd and fans from other towns nearby tore down the schoolhouse finding places to see the game. Extensive windows were smashed and taken out to this end. This was the height of the disorder, and Roseburg fans after the game congratulated the winners, with the hope that they would win the state championship. Roseburg has not seen so many sad faces, and so many happy faces in its history. Local fans pronounced the game well worth the long trip by auto, and all the inconveniences.

Next on the program was Margaret, the lady juggler, followed by Senior Rivas and company. This number was a hair raiser, with one performer on top of the ladder, held and balanced by the other, when suddenly the ladder comes apart, leaving one performer perched high in the air on part of the ladder, then came Cue and Laura with their comedy contortion act, twisting into every possible shape as if made of a piece of rubber. Next came the Fitzgeralds in their high jumping number, while blindfolded jumping from a starting height from one barrel into another. The concluding act on the program was Senior Manuel Marclan, Cuba's greatest wire walker. This slender master of the silver thread presents the most thrilling feats that have ever been seen on the high wire, all of which is done without resting or the aid of pole, umbrella, or other paraphernalia for balancing purposes.
