This is the opinion of Attorney General Van Winkle, who points out that the person occupying the driver's seat and in charge of the steering wheel when the machine is in motion, is the operator of the automobile. Only under special conditions and under special permission are children under 16 years of age permitted to operate automobiles in this state, the opinion points out.

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M. MONTGOMERY BADLY CUT UP IN AUTO SMASH

Mark Montgomery, the Southern Pacific agent of this city, was painfully but not seriously injured in an auto accident late Sunday afternoon, while intent on watching the result of another auto accident that had happened a moment before.

Mr. and Mrs. Montgomery, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Perry with Mrs. Emma Farnum of Butte, Mont., supreme queen of the Daughters of the Nine order, were returning from Grants Pass in Mr. Perry's new Riefenbacher sedan, when near Gold Hill they noticed an overturned auto from which people were scrambling out.

Mr. Perry stopped the car at once, and Mr. Montgomery who had been sitting in the front seat with him, had opened the front door and was just getting out, intending to see if he could be of any assistance, when the driver of the Ford car rammed into the back of the Perry car with such force that Mr. Montgomery's head and shoulders were forced through the glass door, badly cutting him.

The other occupants were scrambled around by the force of the impact, but escaped injury. The car although badly damaged was able to proceed home.

Mr. Montgomery was badly cut by broken glass on the left side of the neck and left cheek, and bled profusely until Medford was reached, when Dr. E. B. Pickel took him in charge. It required four stitches to sew up the gash in his neck. Monte, with his neck swathed in bandages was about town as usual today, attending to business.

Bozy Pepovac, a workman at Gold Hill, who drove his Ford car into the rear of the Perry car, was placed under arrest by Deputy State Motor Traffic Officer J. J. McMahon, and in Justice Taylor's court here today pleaded guilty, asserting that he did not see the Perry car in time, and was fined \$15.

So far as could be learned here no one was injured in the overturning in the first accident.

LEAVE WEDNESDAY FOR STATE MEET

The Medford high school basketball team, champions of southern Oregon will leave Wednesday morning, by train, to play in the state championship tournament at Salem, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday of this week.

This morning at the high school assembly a rally was held to welcome back the victors, and speeches were made by Superintendent Smith, Coach Callison and members of the team.

By a ruling of the state athletic board the Salem high school team is barred from playing in the title series, a charge that Fallin, star guard was ineligible, on account of having played more than four years. The Independence high school five has been selected to represent that district. Salem was one of the strong contenders for the title.

The University high school of Eugene, last year's state champions will not go to the tournament, that honor being held by the Eugene high school.

The lineup of the Medford team in the tournament will be: Chastain and Knipe, forwards; Williams and Helchstein, guards, and Allen, center, with White, Demmer, Hart and Glasscock as substitutes.

A large delegation of southern Oregon fans will go to the state capital to see the contests, making the trip by auto.

The contesting teams will draw lots for opponents, and games will be played afternoon and evening, the finals coming Saturday afternoon and evening.
