## BASEBALL LEAGUE IS ORGANIZED IN EASTERN OREGON

PENDLETON, Ore., March 10.—The Blue Mountain baseball league was officially organized here yesterday and the following six clubs are included: Pendleton, Walla Walla, La Grande, Dayton, Pasco and Elton. The organization elected M. H. Schroeder of Pasco as president of the league while Owner Stephens of Athena was named as vice-president. Carl Heim of La Grande, well known in Umatilla county, was elected secretary-treasurer. A meeting of directors, each club to elect one, has been called by the president for March 15 at a place to be designated later at which time the schedule will be drawn up for the season.

It is the present belief that the schedule will start about April 6 and will be made out to include Sunday games; only individual teams being left free to arrange contests for themselves on Decoration day and the Fourth of July. Each team in the league will be requested to post a \$100 forfeit on deposit and at the end of the season the purse thus attained will be split three ways, three shares going to the winning club, two to the one in second place and one share to the club winding up in third position. About fifty delegates from the six towns in the league were present at the meeting yesterday.

## PILOT ROCK WINS BASKET B. TITLE

PENDLETON, Ore., March 10.—Pilot Rock won the district basketball championship here Saturday night by defeating the Athena five, last year's champions, in a desperately contested game by a 19 to 17 score. Athena started fast and had a big lead in the first quarter, which Pilot Rock gradually overcame. The winning five, which is coached by Glen Walkley, ex-Oregon distance runner, will represent Umatilla, Morrow, Gilliam and Wheeler counties in the state tournament at Salem.

## M'GRAW PREDICTS CINCINNATI WILL GIVE GIANTS RACE

NEW YORK, March 10.—Manager McGraw of the Giants is of the opinion that Cincinnati will offer his team the greatest opposition in the race for the National league pennant and that the Yankees should repeat in the American league without serious competition.

"Pittsburgh may be troublesome, if Carson Higbee is able to play steadily," he said yesterday at Sarasota, Fla., the Giants' training camp. "I would not be surprised to see Boston finish in the first division ahead of either the Cardinals or Cubs. Brooklyn will need new infield strength to improve over last year."

McGraw announced that his contract had three years to run and that he might direct the destinies of his team, even after that period.

The Yankees recaptured New Orleans, 14 to 13, in their first exhibition game of the year at New Orleans yesterday.

The Brooklyn club had a day of complete rest.

CHICAGO, March 10.—The Chicago Cubs are nursing a defeat in their southern California camp today. The Vernon Bengals won, 8 to 7, in the second game at Los Angeles.

## FIRST ANNIVERSARY OF C. T. C. TIRES

The annual meeting of the Columbia Tire Corporation, held at its big plant in Portland on Feb. 12th brought out many important phases of development of this new industry in the northwest. It was disclosed that, the first year of the corporation's existence had brought C-T-C tires into the market against the severe competition of the tire price cutting war of 1923, the corporation pulled through without the loss of a single penny, and assets compare with the current liabilities at a ratio of sixty to one, and the distribution and sale of C-T-C tires is far ahead of the most optimistic anticipations of its builders.

C-T-C tires first made their appearance on the market just a year ago, after having been announced as the development of a group of nationally known tire engineers who for five years previous had been putting the C-T-C tire through all stages of development and design, experimental work and thorough testing with a view to putting on the market a tire which would carry lower inflation than so long recommended in other standard cords, and it was proclaimed that no small part of motoring economy and satisfaction would be enhanced by greater riding comfort and a resiliency that would conserve the car. This end was achieved, it was announced, by the building of a stronger tire with heavier side-walls and an improved compounding. Hand-building also is said to play a large part in the special qualities claimed for the endurance of C-T-C tires and their ability to withstand rough usage. The low inflation principle utilized in C-T-C cords does not necessitate a change in either rim or wheel equipment of standard special purposes, but to meet the more severe motoring conditions and longer distances of the west.

In the few short months since C-T-C tires were introduced their field of distribution is reported as having spread over nine states.

## Raising Stage at the Armory For Paderewski

There have been many inquiries as to whether Paderewski can be seen as well as heard, from all parts of the armory; for it is quite annoying to attend a performance of any kind where a good view of the performer is obstructed. This has all been arranged very satisfactorily by building a stage on top of the stage already in the armory, thus putting the piano and performer in good view of every seat in the house.

It is to be regretted that so splendid a building as the armory should not have been completed for a public auditorium, as well as an armory. There is a movement now on foot to put in raised seats that can be removed when so desired. The Andrews brothers have an opera in rehearsal, which is to be given the 27th and 28th of this month for the purpose of raising funds to complete the reconstruction of the seating in the armory. The house as it is, is all right for a singer, speaker or instrumental performer, with a raised stage, but would be impossible for a large theatrical performance.

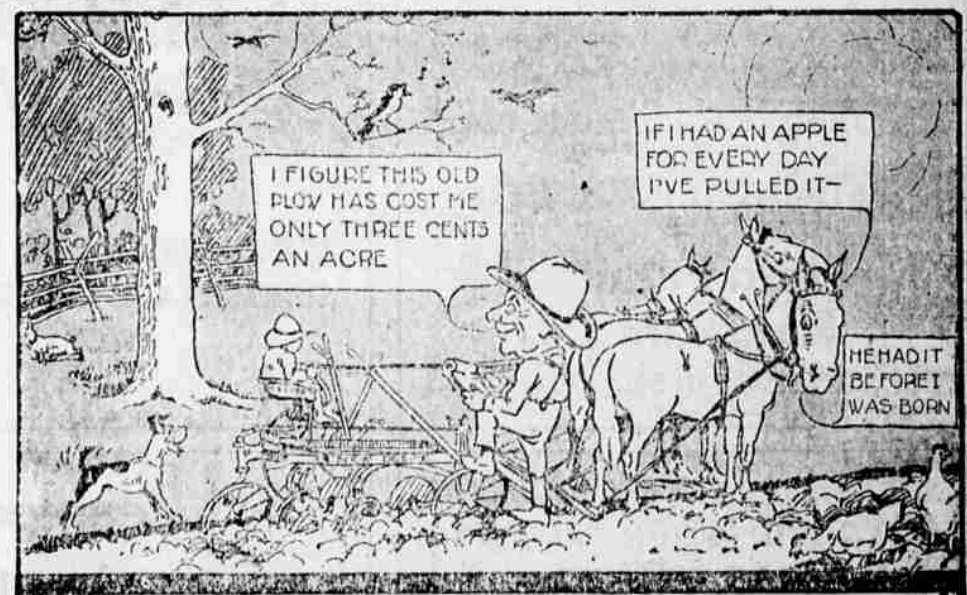
