

MUTILATOR IS KILLED BY MAN JUST IN TIME

LOUISVILLE, Ky., March 10.—Police had before them today the confession of William Gates, 31, a salesman, who shot and killed his erstwhile friend and former employer, Richard Heaton, 33, a broker, after Heaton had kept him a prisoner for two days in a room while he prepared to perform an operation.

Frank Cordell, a private detective of Indianapolis, was under arrest there charged with kidnapping Gates. He is to be returned here whence he fled Thursday night after having aided Heaton, police say, in seizing Gates and removing him to a house, which apparently was rented by Heaton with the view of mutilating Gates.

Gates told the police that he was seized Thursday night in Heaton's office and taken to the house. His captors took one pistol from him but overlooked another he had in a vest pocket. He too, had forgotten it in the excitement but that night when Heaton was preparing to operate upon him, he discovered it. Saturday night, as Heaton was about to handcuff him to a bed, he shot Heaton to death.

Mrs. Heaton was on the first floor when the shooting occurred. Insane jealousy over his wife was the reason attributed by the police for the kidnapping.

Oregon News in Brief

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 10.—Abe Evans, who was convicted of the murder of James Doran in Wasco county more than two years ago and whose execution was stayed by an appeal to the supreme court, was taken from the state penitentiary back to The Dalles last night where he will be sentenced to hang, this being necessary since the supreme court upheld the death sentence of the lower court. Sheriff Chrisman and two deputies came for Evans by automobile and intended to remain here until this morning. A telegram came last night informing them of the break from the county jail at The Dalles and they hastened back by a night trip.

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 10.—Governor Pierce was yesterday discharged from the Salem hospital where he underwent a surgical operation two weeks ago last Saturday for relief from gallstones. The governor's condition has been satisfactory to physicians since the operation but as a matter of precaution he was not allowed to hasten his departure from the hospital. The governor is at his home and expects to be at his office in the state house during the forenoon.

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 10.—Attorney General Van Winkle said last night that Judge John H. Stevenson of Portland will probably be delegated by him to conduct the prosecution of Walter L. Toole, Jr., and J. W. Temple at Dallas where the two men are accused of having participated in a "party" in a hotel room at which two minor girls were present. District Attorney Helgeson of Polk county requested that he be relieved from the case because of a friendship with Toole of many years standing.

PENDLETON, Ore., March 10.—Hay growers in the Boardman region today appealed to the Pendleton commercial association, asking aid in securing ships to carry hay to Boston and New York. The Co-operative Hay association has an order for 500 tons to be delivered on the east coast in April. Manager Jewett reports that he cannot get ships from Portland and asks aid in securing shipment through Astoria or Seattle.

Owing to the mild winter much hay is on hand in the interior, but the demand is brisk on the east coast. Growers say unless shipping facilities are provided, they will be seriously injured. One previous shipment to Hiram brought \$15 per ton, f. o. b. Hiramston.

Fertilizer Loan Rejected. WASHINGTON, March 10.—The senate refused today by a vote of 31 to 24 to approve an appropriation of \$5,000,000 to be loaned to farmers to finance purchases of fertilizers. It was the first record vote of the session upon a farm relief measure.

PREST CAMPBELL U. OF O. ADDRESSES LOCAL KIWANIS

The Kiwanis club at its meeting today decided to take up the underprivileged child work in this community as its principal object for 1924, and President Lemmon appointed a committee to take charge of the same.

President E. L. Campbell of the University of Oregon complimented the local club on its decision to help the underprivileged child, which is a wonderful work.

He said the underlying principal of human motive is essentially social and inclined to good works and while individuals have accomplished and are doing wonderful work, actions of groups are much more effective and accomplish greater things.

Mr. Campbell called attention to the chaotic conditions prevailing in other countries and said there is a great work to be done among the young people in this country to promote greater industry, good will and intelligence and said the key to solve the world's problem is education in connection with the church.

R. E. Kuykendall, an attorney of Portland, president of the U. of O. alumni association, stated they are here to meet the local committee in the interest of raising a million dollars among the U. of O. alumni to build a world war memorial court at the university, erect a library and to assist with needed athletic improvements. He said it only means \$269 per capita for the 38,000 alumni members and that they would get it.

Carl Bowman, superintendent of the Lakeview schools, is here on the same mission and made a short talk.

E. F. Carlton, of the department of education of U. of O., is in the city visiting schools and also made a few remarks.

The date for the charity ball was set for April 21st and Chairman C. M. Kidd announced the committees for the same.

Death Toll of the Automobile

PORTLAND, Ore., March 10.—One woman died from injuries received in an automobile accident and another hanged herself here yesterday.

Mrs. Edward A. Bamford died at a hospital late yesterday from internal injuries sustained when her husband's car skidded from the pavement and turned over on the Canyon road near here.

With a cord from a bathrobe Mrs. Augusta Hartig, 79, hanged herself in her home here. She had fastened the cord to the top of a door. Her body was found by her daughter, Mrs. Gust Schneider. Illness was thought to have been the cause.

and at the same time, if properly constructed, will produce power enough to sell at low costs to the cities and communities adjoining to pay back every cent the government invests in not more than thirty years. Similarly, the sale of power from the other great projects, whether for irrigation, navigation or flood control may be made to pay back the entire cost of the development.

Declaring that only the government "can cut the cost of production to the bone," the statement gives as reasons: "The government can borrow the capital from four to five per cent while the private companies pay six to eight. That alone of \$500,000,000 means a saving of \$10,000,000 a year to cut the cost of current."

"The government amortizes the capital account so that in 25 or 30 years it is all paid off. That means ultimately this system on the basis of \$500,000,000 at five per cent would save \$25,000,000 and the cost of electric service could thus be cut accordingly."

The Norris Keller bill is declared to be "the outgrowth of the work of the public ownership league of America, in co-operation with Senator Norris, Dill, Fraser, Hall, LaFollette and others in the senate and Congressmen Keller, Swing, Wefald, Kyale, LaGuardia, Sinclair and others in the house."

LOVERS' QUARREL ENDS IN DEATH OF MAN AND WOMAN

LOS ANGELES, March 10.—A lovers' quarrel, ending in murder and suicide, was the explanation police today offered for the deaths here late last night of Detective F. L. Pratt, 45 of the Los Angeles police force, and Mrs. Mildred Pearl Lloyd, divorced wife of L. P. Schultz.

Pratt's body with two bullet wounds in the head and one through the heart, was found in his automobile in a busy street in the northwest section of the city. Three blocks away in the home of her husband, police found Mrs. Lloyd dead of poisoning and on her person a note which, they said, explained that "Daddy and I have decided to end it all."

Though the note indicated a suicide pact police pointed out, the wounds in Pratt's head and heart indicated murder, while the finding of a pistol with three empty cartridges some distance away from the body made any other explanation but murder and suicide impossible, according to investigators. Witnesses saw Mrs. Lloyd run from the scene of the shooting, police said.

FLORIDA WINS PRIZE LEGION MEMBERSHIP

INDIANAPOLIS, March 10.—Florida led all states in the renewal of the American Legion memberships for 1924 and as a result a trophy given by Past National Commander Henry D. Lindsley has been awarded to that state. It was announced at national headquarters of the legion. Second place was won by legionnaires of Mexico, which is given the same status as a state; Wisconsin was third and Washington fourth.

Among the business callers here Monday were Ed Dutton, T. E. Nichols, one of our retired merchants. Mr. Nichols is one of the pioneer residents of Jackson county, as he came here with his parents in the early fifties and lived with them until his father's death, when he took charge of the business of the farm and stock, continuing to live on the farm for a number of years when he turned the farming business over to his son-in-law, Benj. Brophy, now deceased, and decided to move to Eagle Point and invest a part of his money in a bank building and later in a store building to be occupied by Mr. Heath, now a druggist of Medford, and later Mr. Heath sold out his stock of goods to a Jew firm of Portland, who decided to take what goods they could dispose of here, back to Portland, thus leaving the store building vacant on his hands so he finally decided to buy out the Jew firm and go into the mercantile business himself in his old age, an entirely new business, but he found that he knew more about the cattle, hay and farming business than he did the mercantile business, altho he had an experienced sales woman to assist in the management, Mrs. R. A. Weidman, but he finally sold out the goods and rented the building to another one of his sons-in-law, F. J. McPherson and retired from business, and since the death of his wife last fall, has gone to live on the farm again with his daughter, Mrs. Anna Brophy, but the time I met him he was here stopping a few days with his daughter, Mrs. McPherson. He has a number of very warm friends here who have known him for many years.

R. A. Petty, who is living on the old Sam Potter place and has been experimenting in the turkey business, to a certain extent, tells me that he has sold out his turkeys and quit the business, as they were troublesome to his neighbors, and there was too much brush to handle them to advantage.
