

ASHLAND H. S. IS DEBATING CHAMP SOUTH. OREGON

ASHLAND, Mar. 10.—As a result of the Grants Pass debate with Phoenix, which ended with a score of 2-1 in favor of Grants Pass, the Ashland high school debating team becomes the champion of southern Oregon. The Ashland and Grants Pass teams are equal in the number of decisions but Ashland has 14 points to the 10 points of Grants Pass. Ashland won from Grants Pass 3-0 in both places, and in the recent debate with Medford won the decision in Ashland 3-0 but lost 2-1 in Medford. The won the same decisions in the debate with Phoenix. The next debate will probably be held in Klamath Falls, which is outside the southern Oregon district, only Jackson and Josephine counties comprising the last. A new question, "Resolved that Federal Subsidies to the State Accompanied by Federal Supervision are Objectionable" will be debated from now on. Only one team is required, which will be compelled to take both the affirmative and negative sides at different times. The teams have been composed of John Galey and Marion Costley, taking the negative and Earl Nutter and Bernard Joy the affirmative, with Roland Parks as alternate. Miss Ethel Wheeler, English teacher in the high school, has charge of the debating and much credit is due her for her splendid work along this line. About four more debates stand between Ashland and the state championship honors.

A group of Ashland citizens left Saturday for a business and pleasure trip in Portland. Charles Pierce of the Ford agency will stay in that place for about a week on business and N. H. Harrison will stay several days. Kenneth McWilliams, who drove the group to Portland, is making a short business trip to the Ford agency in Portland as he once worked at that place. He will return soon and take up his duties as salesman for the local agency. These people were accompanied by several Fordson tractor demonstrators of the Portland Ford agency.

A series of basketball games have been given recently by the Y. M. C. A., an organization composed of some of the younger boys of the town. These boys have been playing different teams over the valley, and last Friday evening played a game with the Grants Pass Boy Scouts, winning the game by a score of 24-9. The Ashland Scouts also won from another Grants Pass scout team by 12-6. These games are very exciting and some very good specimens of basketball are played, despite the little training that these boys have had. Mr. Henry is the coach for the teams and has done excellent work. This is a wonderful beginning for boys who have an athletic tendency, and it will make them much better players than they would otherwise be. At the first game that was played, admission of five cents was charged, and about fifteen dollars was cleared, the sum of which went into the fund for the junior high playshed. Ten cents admission was charged Saturday night and over twenty dollars was taken in, some of which went toward the expenses of the evening, so that over \$17 was cleared to go into the playshed fund.

CALIFORNIA URGES IMMIGRATION BAR ON ASIATIC RACES

WASHINGTON, March 11.—Four California organizations joined today in urging the senate immigration committee to retain in the immigration bill a section which would exclude aliens not eligible to citizenship. The Japanese embassy has protested such a law.

The California department of the American Legion, the California Federation of Labor, the State Grange and the Native Sons of the Golden West were represented before the committee. The case was presented by Attorney General U. S. Webb, former Senator Phelan and V. S. McClatchy of Sacramento.

McClatchy argued that if immigration is to be restricted, the logical course would be first to exclude those who under the American laws may never become citizens. "Immigration," said Mr. McClatchy, "is a domestic question which this government should regulate without the suggestion or interference from any foreign nation. Of the yellow and brown races, the Japanese are less assimilable and most dangerous if admitted as permanent residents of this country."

Mr. McClatchy said that in 1880 there were no Japanese residents in California, whereas there were not less than 100,000 now, and quoted the state board of health as saying that if existing conditions continue ultimately the Japanese will exceed the whites in California. In some parts of the state the Japanese births already exceed those of the whites, he said, and they control one-eighth of the state's rich irrigated lands, having driven white laborers and tenants away from farms.

"They have displaced whites in business," Mr. McClatchy continued. "In Los Angeles city licenses are paid by over 4000 businesses owned and operated by Japanese, including over 1100 vegetable and fruit stores and over 500 grocery stores."

78 BODIES TAKEN FROM UTAH MINE

CASTLE GATE, Utah, Mar. 11.—(By Associated Press.) At 6:10 o'clock there were 95 bodies remaining in mine No. 2 of the Utah Fuel company in which 173 men were entombed by a series of explosions early Saturday. Sixteen bodies were removed from the interior of the mine between two o'clock and six o'clock this morning, making a total of 78 bodies recovered.

Of the 78 bodies recovered, 16 remain unidentified, eight of those unidentified were taken from the mine during the night. Rescue crews that have been working all night exploring the mine and removing bodies were relieved at six o'clock this morning by four fresh crews.

ICY BLAST SWEEPS O'ER SOUTHLAND

ATLANTA, Ga., March 11.—An icy blast today held the south in a tight grip with temperatures reported below freezing in many sections. Extreme cold weather was reported in Virginia and the Carolinas and the freezing mark was registered in Georgia as far south as the Florida line. Low temperatures were reported in Alabama, Louisiana and Mississippi. Thermometers here at 7 o'clock reported 24 degrees.

Sports FIRST BIG LEAGUE TRAINING SEASON GAME ON TODAY

CHICAGO, March 11.—The first game this year between major league baseball clubs is to be played today between Brooklyn and the St. Louis Nationals at Bradenton, Fla., the Cardinals' training quarters.

DEMPSEY REFUSES HALF A MILLION TO FIGHT WILLS

NEW YORK, March 11.—(By the Associated Press.)—Jack Dempsey, world heavyweight champion, probably will accept a motion picture contract which will prevent him from defending his title before next September, his manager, Jack Kearns, told John Griffin, Providence, R. I., promoter, yesterday, after rejecting the latter's bid for a Dempsey-Harry Wills match at Cumberland, R. I., July 4.

According to Griffin, Kearns said the champion probably would risk his championship but once this year and that in a return bout with Luis Firpo, Griffin, accompanied by James J. McGinnity, representing the Rhode Island Veterans of Foreign Wars, offered Dempsey \$500,000 to fight Wills.

VON KAHR DENIES PLOT WITH HITLER, GERMAN 'PUTSCH'

MUNICH, Bavaria, March 11.—(By the Associated Press.)—Dr. Von Kahr, the former Bavarian dictator, testifying today at the putch trial, sought to clear himself of all connection with the Hitler revolt, saying it was absolutely out of the question that he or General Von Lossow, the reichswehr commander in Bavaria, had reached any understanding with Hitler for overthrowing the government.

"We consider Hitler, Hitler's followers, and Hitler's plans as utterly impossible," he declared.

He looked upon the incident in the beer cellar the night Hitler appeared with a revolver and several hundred followers, as a comedy over which he laughed secretly at the time. It was not taken seriously by him or Von Lossow, although for the moment they pretended to surrender.

Dr. Von Kahr, composed and speaking in a low voice, read his testimony from a manuscript.

The attorneys for the defense objected, but were overruled.
