BIG MEETING OF LOCAL MERCHANTS AND EMPLOYEES

The meeting of the Medford Merchants' association and their employees at the Hotel Medford last evening was the largest gathering of its kind ever held in Medford, excepting possibly when the state merchants' meeting was held here several years ago. There were 146 present, about one-third being women and young ladies.

The meeting was a beneficial one and enjoyable and will prove of great value in the future to every employer and employee and the public.

It shows progress and interest in their work when owners and managers of stores and their employees meet at the banquet board to hear a general discussion of business and to study how to render better service and give more attention to the buying public. More of such gatherings would be the means of not only promoting better feelings among employers and employees and the public, but would be the greatest power to fight mail order houses.

After a bounteous chicken dinner, such as Mr. Mohr is noted for serving, F. A. Nasley of the University of Oregon School of Business Administration, made a splendid talk on "Why People Quit Trading at the Stores," illustrated with charts.

Mr. Nagley showed a sample questionnaire sent to all parts of the state to business men, farmers, housewives and others and out of 1,483 that were returned these answers were given why people quit trading at stores:

Indifference of salespeople, 391; haughtiness of salespeople, 321; over-insistence of salespeople, 254; ignorance of goods, 152; misrepresentation of goods, 288; attempted substitution of goods, 265; delays in store service, 462; errors, 335; reluctance to exchange goods, 184; tricky methods, 224; poor quality of goods, 439; poor advertising, 67; high prices, 600; store arrangement or appearance, 232; wrong policies of management, 243.

In commenting upon the answers the speaker said 30 per cent of all reasons were in the first three items, which is the fault of the salespeople, all of which is absolutely unnecessary; 43 per cent was in the first 10 reasons or in handling customers after they are brought into the store; that the greatest number on any one item was high prices. Regarding this he said this is always the greatest reason and is largely physiological. People complain of high prices on general principles and very often are mistaken and are not acquainted with the real costs, conditions, etc.

Mr. Nagley read a number of the reasons sent in, many of which were real reasons, many were imaginary and some were exceedingly amusing and unreasonable. He emphasized the point however that it made no difference whether the customers are right or wrong, it is their idea and to never argue or question them because one invariably loses their patronage and it costs money and time to get new customers. He said it is all right to make suggestions to customers but never to pass one's opinions on what they look good in or should wear. If a woman insists she has a No. 3 foot and it takes a No. 4 or 5 shoes to fit her, fit her foot and say nothing about the size.

OBITUARY

MANNING—John Wesley Manning died at his home in Klamath county, March 10, from infirmities of old age. Aged 87 years 11 months and 24 days. Born at Mansfield, Ohio, March 16, 1836. He was one of the early pioneers of Oregon, coming with the gold rush of 1849. He was mail contractor between Yreka, Cal., and Roseburg, Ore., before the railroad; also served as a scout in the Modoc Indian wars under General Canby and also served as sheriff of Jackson county from 1875 to 1879. He had been a resident of Klamath county since 1885 and leave his wife, Belle, two daughters and three sons, Mrs. Waite Fay, Portland, Ore.; Mrs. Frances Schallhorn, Klamath Falls, Ore.; and A. J. Manning, Klamath Falls, Ore. George W. Manning, Albany, Ore. The remains will arrive from Klamath Falls Wednesday evening and funeral services will be held at the grave in Jacksonville cemetery Thursday at 10:30 a. m. Funeral arrangements are in charge of the Perl Funeral Home.

RUSSIA, GERMANY AND U. S. SOUGHT FOR L. OF N. UNITY

GENEVA, Mar. 11.—(By Associated Press.) What the audience interpreted as a plea for American, German and Russian adhesion to the League of Nations was delivered by Lord Parmoor today at the opening public session of the league council.

After pledging the British labor government to wholehearted support of the league's policy and activities, Lord Parmoor declared that world-wide or European problems could never be satisfactorily settled until all the countries interested in these problems, became members of the league. After Hjalmar Branting of Sweden had read a cablegram of confidence which was the president of the council he had sent to Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, the new president of the council, Senator Guani of Uruguay, delivered an impressive eulogy of Mr. Wilson. The speaker alluded to him as creator of the League of Nations, "the illustrious leader who had contributed to the abolition of war by promoting the brotherhood of man through the foundation of an international organization of conciliation which had become necessary to the existence of the world."

Senator Guani predicted that President Wilson would go down in history as one of the great figures of mankind.

Foreign Minister Benes of Czechoslovakia, who made his official entrance into the deliberations of the council, pledged Czechoslovakia's support to the league.

OPINIONS HANDED DOWN BY OREGON SUPREME COURT

SALEM, Ore., March 11.—The following opinions were handed down today by the supreme court:

W. C. Winslow vs. I. N. Fleischer, et al. appellants; appeal from Marion county; suit to enforce enforcement of order issued by state game commission. Opinion by Justice Coshaw. Judge George G. Bingham affirmed.

W. H. W. Hamilton vs. Hamilton Mammoth Mines, inc., appellant; appeal from Baker county; appeal from judgment rendered in favor of plaintiff and respondent in action involving contract. Opinion by Justice Coshaw. Judge David R. Parker affirmed.

R. M. Walker, et al. appellants, vs. County Court of Polk county; appeal from Polk county; suit to obtain sale of road bonds. Opinion by Justice Rand. Judge George R. Bagley affirmed.

Fred C. Twigger, appellant, vs. Martha Twigger, appeal from Multnomah county; action involving possession of real estate. Opinion by Justice Burnett. Judge George W. Stapleton affirmed.

A. L. Jeffries vs. Charles Pankow.

appellant, appeal from Tillamook county; action to recover an automobile. Opinion by Justice Burnett. Judge George R. Bagley reversed.

Margaret Marshall, appellant, vs. Fred Marshall; appeal from Klamath county; appeal from decree granting divorce and custody of minor to respondent. Opinion by Chief Justice McBride. Motion allowed.

Frank R. Shores, appellant, vs. Fred Hollister, appeal from Coos county; suit for dissolution of partnership and accounting. Opinion by court. Judge John H. Coke affirmed.

A. G. Lyons and H. J. Bennett, doing business under name of Star Employment agency, appellant, vs. C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner; appeal from Marion county; suit to require respondent to issue permit authorizing appellants to conduct employment agency. Opinion by Justice Burnett. Judge Geo. G. Bingham affirmed.

Motion to recall mandate denied in Robinson vs. Cable.

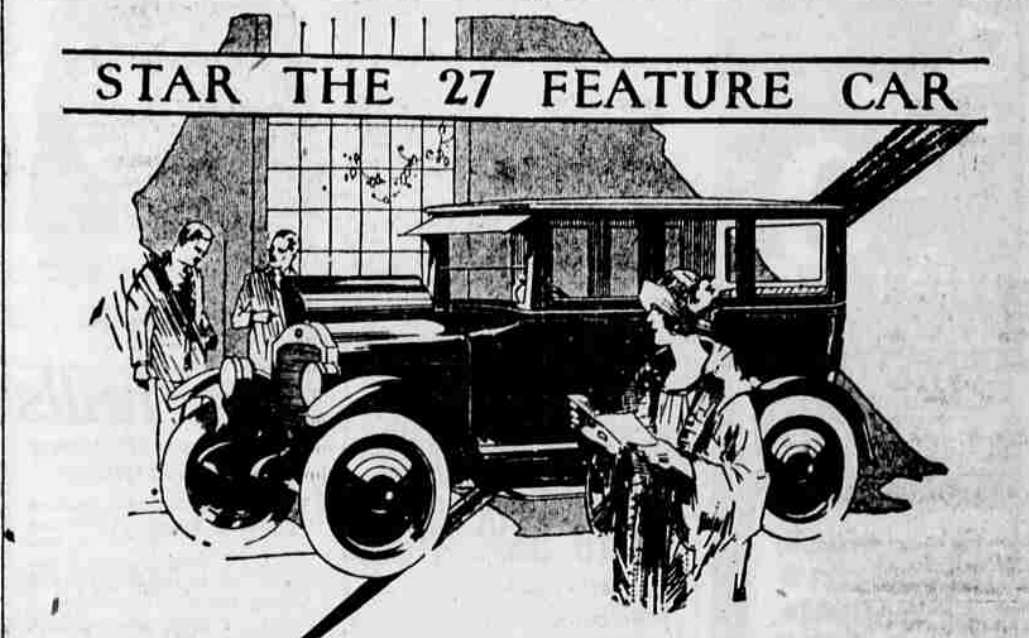
