INVESTIGATE CLAIM CAPITOL IS 'WET'

WASHINGTON, March 12.—An effort to settle the question of the effectiveness of prohibition enforcement in Washington has been ordered by President Coolidge as a result of the charge by Rear Admiral Charles P. Plunkett, commandant of the Brooklyn navy yard, that the capital is "the wettest city in the United States."

The president upon learning of Admiral Plunkett's statement, summoned Prohibition Commissioner Haynes to find out if the Brooklyn commandant had been correctly quoted and if so, to ascertain the basis of his information and initiate an investigation looking to correction of the alleged condition in the capital.

OIL LEASE COUNSEL REACH CHEYENNE

CHEYENNE, Wyo., March 12.—Altee Pomerene and Owen Roberts, special government counsel arrived here at 2:15 o'clock this afternoon for preliminary hearing tomorrow on the government's suit for annulment of the lease of Teapot Dome Oil reserve to the Mammoth Oil company.

Mr. Roberts said shortly after his arrival that no action in connection with the proposed annulment proceedings would be taken today.

Mr. Roberts also announced that he and Mr. Pomerene would confer this afternoon with A. D. Walton, United States district attorney for Wyoming. He added that no statement concerning the procedure to be followed would be made until after this conference.

PORTLAND, Ore., March 12.—Police here are holding Nick Yarnovich, 31, who told them that he had slain Vince Strickho at Kansas City, Mo., in 1915. Nightmares, he said, had caused him to divulge that he was guilty of the crime. Police wired to Kansas City and received a message telling them to hold Yarnovich. The killing, according to the prisoner, was committed because Strickho had knife him two years before while he was attempting to tear a friend from Strickho's grasp. Yarnovich said he was arrested by the police at the time, but was released.
