

## EDISON SUBSIDIARY CONCERN DENIES IT BLOCKED U. S. AID

WASHINGTON, March 12.—A sweeping denial that the Southern California Edison company of Los Angeles sought to prevent construction by the government of Boulder canyon dam was made today by H. H. Ballard, vice-president and general manager of the company.

Mr. Ballard, who came here to make his position clear before the house irrigation committee, asserted he had been charged with statements he did not make and "that unwarranted conclusions" had been drawn from things he said.

Declaring his company was not opposed to an appropriation by the government for control of the Colorado river, Mr. Ballard in his prepared statement declared:

"The Imperial valley is entitled to protection from floods caused by the erratic flow of this international stream and all of the potential electric capacity of the river should be developed. If the government will start this development by providing the funds for construction of the first dam, we are prepared to make electrical installations and generally distribute the power throughout the whole territory."

He said to avoid waste and duplication all expenditures by the government engineers. Such a plan, he added, is not provided for in the Johnson-Swain bill pending before the committee.

Development by the company, Mr. Ballard explained, would be under the terms of the federal water power act and it is willing that any license or permit granted by the federal government or the states affected be made subject to the Colorado river compact.

## TOKIO DENIES ANY PACT WITH RUSSIA

TOKIO, Mar. 12.—(By Associated Press.) Categorical denial of reports from Moscow that Japan has made overtures for formal Russo-Japanese negotiations was entered today by the foreign office here. It was authoritatively learned however, that the question of Russian recognition has reached a new stage as far as the Tokyo cabinet is concerned. At the cabinet's last session to which Foreign Minister Matsui submitted a lengthy report concerning the Russian situation, there was a discussion as to whether the time was ripe to consider resumption of relations. No decision was reached, but there are good reasons for believing that the cabinet, which hitherto had been concerned almost exclusively with domestic problems, has not turned seriously to the question of soviet recognition.

**Pope Intercedes.**  
LONDON, March 12.—Pope Pius, according to the Daily Telegraph, has asked Premier MacDonald to intercede with the soviet government in behalf of the Catholic clergy imprisoned in Russia.

## RADIO IMPULSES GO 8500 MILES IN .054 SECONDS, TEST SAYS

WASHINGTON, March 12.—What was said to have been the first attempt at accurate measurement of the velocity of radio impulses was made here last night by experts of the Radio Corporation of America. Using a motion picture film device as the measuring instrument, a radio signal was recorded as making a complete circuit of 8500 miles in .054 seconds between the corporation's sending station as it was sent from a key in the radio corporation's office in New York and again as it came back on a lower wave length from Warsaw. The photographic record was produced by an indicator attached to the receiving set and the time was measured by the distance between the photographic impressions on the film.

In calculating the transmission time of the radio signal, a carefully figured broadcasting point on this side and between the receiving and sending stations at Warsaw. With the wire transmission included, the lapse of the time between the sending and return of the signal was figured at .130 seconds.

## UP TO WEATHER IN WORLD FLIGHT

WASHINGTON, March 12.—Success of the army around-the-world flight which starts from Los Angeles next Sunday depends "almost entirely upon weather conditions," the war department said in an announcement today giving detailed information as to flying schedule.

"Unless the flight moves throughout the entire route with a regularity which will allow it to pass through the danger zones during a given period," said the statement, "its eventual success is doubtful."

The fliers are to arrive at Seattle, March 24; Prince Rupert, B. C., April 1; Chelakoff Island, Island of Attu, April 11; a point in Japan, April 27; Calcutta, India, May 28; San Stefano, Turkey, June 29; London, July 1; Boston, August 2, and Washington not later than August 19.

## HIRAM RAPS CAL TO WIN DAKOTA

BISMARCK, N. D., March 12.—Criticizing the administration of President Coolidge and declaring the policy of the administration is "un-American," and makes this country a partner in war," Senator Hiram Johnson of California, candidate for the republican presidential nomination, in an address here last night continued his campaign in North Dakota for endorsement at next Tuesday's primary.

Mr. Johnson said E. L. Doherty, oil magnate, had loaned \$5,000,000 to the Mexican government and that he "wondered if the Mexican policy of the American government had anything to do with the loan."

## O. A. C. MILITARY BAND HERE MARCH 12

The Oregon Agricultural college band which will appear here March 19 at the Armory has played at every world's fair held on the Pacific coast since 1905. Organized in 1893 and directed by student leaders for many years, the band has grown to its present proportions of from 50 to 70 members each year. It has won the name of being one of the best college bands on the coast. Captain H. L. Beard, former student of Herbert L. Clark, world-famous cornetist and band leader, has directed the band 15 years of its 31 years existence.

In addition to these trips, the band has always taken an annual concert tour during spring vacations thru the state or adjoining states averaging 900 miles.

Every year has been marked in the history of the organization by some improvement in its standing with the college and state. Recognition is given the band men in place of the military drill requirements for graduation from the institution. Credit is also allowed for the music lessons taken on band instruments taken under Captain Beard's instruction. The strength and reputation of the organization has increased until it is able to take extensive trips that play a big part in attracting student musicians to the college.

Many former O. A. C. band men have made notable records. During the war it was found that 60 musicians and three band masters formerly college men were in the service of the United States army. Nine of the former members were taken to Washington, D. C., last year with the Portland Shrine band where they played with thousands of other musicians under the direction of Sousa. These men were also invited to play with Sousa's band when it appeared in concert at Portland in January.

**Tribute to Rail Head.**  
NEW YORK, March 12.—All trains of the New York Central lines halt for one minute today and every employee will pause at three o'clock eastern time, the hour of the funeral services for Alfred H. Smith, president, who was killed when thrown from a horse last Saturday.

## THE SUGAR BUSINESS WAS NOTHING WORTH WHILE LAST YEAR

NEW YORK, Mar. 12.—The American Sugar Refining company received profits of \$8,508,163, in the form of investment income and interest in 1923, of which \$5,152,487 represented income from investments largely in sugar producing companies, says the annual report made public today.

This amount, with \$2,955,675, interest earned, was sufficient the report said, to cover a loss on refining operations of \$1,693,070 and to provide for depreciation, bond interest and preferred dividends and leave a balance of \$865,197 for surplus. Sales of various investments gave a profit of \$4,452,631, which has been set aside to strengthen the company's refining facilities in New York harbor.

Earl D. Babst, president, emphasized that 1923 was unprofitable for cane sugar refiners. The price of raw sugar changed 115 times, he said, the extreme fluctuating causing a loss of \$1,693,070 on 1,165,000 tons of raw sugar refined by the company. In 1922 the company refined 1,650,000 tons at a profit of \$10,083,832.

Sales of the company totaled \$200,000,000. Nearly 600,000,000 pounds of package sugar alone were sold.

Sugar refiners had all the ups and downs of a ten year pre-war period crowded into 1923 Mr. Babst asserted, the company's inventory fluctuating as much as \$2,500,000 in a single day. In disorganized post-war prices sugar rose to greater extremes than any other commodity, the report stated. Compared with average prices of 1910 sugar's fluctuation since the armistice is shown to have been greater than the combined fluctuations of wool, rubber, coal and copper.

Women comprise about half the company's 26,781 stockholders.

## 127 BODIES TAKEN FROM UTAH MINE

CASTLE GATE, Utah, Mar. 12.—Early this morning, 127 bodies had been recovered from the Utah Fuel company mine No. 2 in which 173 men were entombed Saturday by an explosion.

Work of removing the bodies was greatly hampered during the night by unexpected obstructions encountered and also by water in the mine workings. Workers reported to the fuel company headquarters early this morning that fourteen additional bodies had been located, in one of the rooms.

Not a pump has been worked in the mine interior since the three blasts early Saturday morning put them out of order. As a result, parts of the mine are declared to be flooded, which necessarily makes the removal of the remaining bodies extremely difficult.

Plans were made during the night to put one or more pumps into operation this morning if possible, in order that rescue crews may continue their work.

The first funeral service for the victims will be held at Castle Gate this morning.

## BRITISH LEGATION IN ATHENS WRECKED

ATHENS, Mar. 12.—(By Associated Press.) A bomb was exploded early today at the entrance to the British legation, causing material damage, but injuring no one. Greek officials expressed belief the incident was staged in an effort to discredit the government.

The premier and minister of interior expressed the regrets of the Greek government to the British minister after the outrage. An inquiry was opened under the direction of British police officials and several suspects were detained.

**Honduras Adrift.**

WASHINGTON, March 12.—The death of former President Gutierrez and the consequent increased activities of revolutionary factions have left Honduras for the time being without any government whatever. Members of the diplomatic corps succeeded in bringing about a 71-hour armistice which began at 5 p. m. last Monday, between the revolutionary leaders.
