Oregon News in Brief

ROSEBURG, Ore., Mar. 12.—Plans are being made for the dedication of the new highway bridge at Winchester which is to be named in honor of H. A. Booth, former state highway commissioner. The exercises will probably be held on the afternoon of Sunday, April 27. Governor Pierce, Mayor Baker, Judge O. P. Coshove, R. A. Booth and Bishop Walter Sumner will be the speakers. All mayors in the state will be invited to attend as guests of honor and every chamber of commerce will receive special invitations to attend. Efforts are also being made to have all booster organizations present in costume.

The Winchester bridge is one of the finest on the Pacific highway and is the pride of the highway commission.

PENDLETON, Ore., Mar. 12.—Two accidents at the McKay dam under construction by the United States reclamation service yesterday afternoon and last night resulted in a broken leg for R. B. Cox of Pendleton and in the death of S. W. Rice, 60, residence as yet unknown.

In the afternoon a gravel car swung off its trucks and fractured Cox's leg. Rice was killed when he was struck by a construction train crossing part of the gravel pit south east of the dam. The train crash thought him to be on the train but he was ahead of the engine and was not seen until he was struck. According to reports he made no efforts to get off the track, either not hearing the approach of the dinky or underestimating its speed.

EUGENE, Ore., March 12.—Verdict of guilty of manslaughter was returned last night by the circuit court jury which heard the case against James Palmer, 17 year old Cottage Grove youth, charged with second degree murder in the slaying of Ralph Lamers on January 10.

Lammers was fatally stabbed in a fight following an argument in a Cottage Grove pool hall.

Palmer was apparently unmoved by the verdict. Manslaughter carries a minimum penalty of one year in the state penitentiary with a maximum of fifteen years.

PENDLETON, Ore., March 12.—J. J. Murray, alias Sam Stewart, smashed the plate glass window of a local jewelry store last night and got away with a lot of loot consisting mostly of watches, but not for long. Warned by a porter in the next building as to what had occurred, a posse headed by Night Policeman Stanley gave spirited chase, and following the alleged burglar by a trail of blood, he had cut his hand in smashing the window with a piece of timber, through a rooming house and out on the street, captured him after Stanley's third shot had hit him in the right hip and lodged in his right groin.

SALEM, Ore., March 12.—A. C. McIntyre of Helix today filed declaration of his candidacy for the republican nomination for district attorney of Umatilla county with the secretary of state.

James H. E. Scott of Milton also filed his candidacy for the same nomination late yesterday.

MARINES WERE USED

President Harding wrote Fall under date of June 24, 1922, that unless James G. Harden of the Mutual Oil company, got off the teapot he should be ejected.

"I have a call out for an interview with Mr. Harden," the president's letter said.

Fall replied that Harden's purpose was to "tie up" the reserve and that he should be ejected without court action.

Upon the conclusion of Secretary Roosevelt's testimony the committee closed its doors to go through another batch of telegrams.

Little additional information was received from examination of the messages, which were supplied from the Washington office of the Western Union. Tomorrow the committee will take up the report of accountants who have audited brokers' books and will call several other witnesses in clearing the way for the inquiry into the Leonard Wood, Jr., story about an attempted oil deal at the Chicago convention in 1920.

Tammann called Christian's attention to an article in the Post on the election of the Mutual company from Teapot. Christian transmitted the letter to Fall with a request for material on which to base an answer and Fall responded with a history of the naval reserve, and a discussion of the legal controversy raised as to titles upon it.

It was the duty of the navy, the interior secretary's reply insisted, to protect the reserves and, he added, that the marines were the navy's police force for that purpose.

President Harding was personally acquainted with a "certain gentleman," chiefly concerned in the Mutual Oil company attempt to secure Dome oil, and took a hand himself, the Fall letter indicated, in trying to dissuade his acquaintance from pursuing the enterprise. This "certain gentleman" refused to yield to the president's representations.

Senator Walsh asked who the "certain gentleman" was but the witness said he didn't know. Senator Bursum, republican, New Mexico, asked if there was any precedent for the marine activities and the witness replied that none could be found in the records in the navy department. He added that there was an opinion among naval men that a threat to use the marines in California for a similar purpose had been made some years before.

Roosevelt said he had casually mentioned the sending of marines to Teapot to President Harding, who had approved.

"There was nothing in my mind but to protect the naval reserve," Roosevelt said.

Characterizing the sending of marines to Teapot as an "outrageous use

of the military force," Senator Walsh charged that armed forces were used because Fall and Sinclair did not want to precipitate court action, in which would be raised the question of the validity of the lease made by Fall.

ington Courthouse, which the attorney general, Smith and others maintained.

Hesitating Miss Stinson said she "could tell better later," of the conference between Darden and others Smith had told her the attorney general and himself met in the "green house," because they could meet "privately."

Daugherty was in Columbus, she said, when she saw Colonel Darden at the "shack."

"I know they had something that they were considering."

"There was something wrong some where," she continued. "They did drop Mr. Darden."

"What brought this about was that Darden did not measure up," said Miss Stinson.

"Measure up to what?" demanded Senator Ashurst.

"They dropped him," was the answer.

Questioned by Senator Wheeler, answered, "Yes," when asked if Smith was a partner "in these various deals."

On that she said her chief knowledge came from Smith. She said she knew of a deal, between Daugherty and Darden of which Smith had told her.

She said Smith gave Darden \$2400 and he told her Daugherty gave the same amount to Darden.

"They had a deal in an oil proposition out west," she said.

Smith told her, she said, that Colonel Darden "for years has been trying to get through some leases some way through Washington, prior to this administration."

"If this isn't a pipe dream it may probably make us a lot of money," she said Smith told her.

"Harry Daugherty and Jesse Smith put in \$2400 apiece," she reiterated.

Sensor Wheeler went back to the Carpenter-Dempsey fight films.

Miss Stinson said the proposition was that transportation of the films was a legal violation and if the films could be transported without prosecution "they" were to receive \$150,000.

"Whether that was ever consummated, I do not know."

Certain "picture companies" unnamed she said, were to be in negotiation with Smith, he told her. In reply to questions she said Smith was the go-between for the attorney general and picture companies. A transaction in Pacific oil stock was then brought up by Senator Wheeler. Miss Stinson said it was in the fall of 1922.

Pacific Oil, and Manhattan Shirt shares were placed with Smith's bankers and afterward taken away, she said.

Miss Stinson did not know Smith got the stock. Smith withdrew the stocks "suddenly" from the brokers, she said. That Smith said the stock was given to him.

From the fight pictures the testimony veered to "a deal" in which Smith and Daugherty, the witness said, had each put \$2400 with Colonel J. G. Darden, who, Smith told her, she said, "had been trying for years to get some leases through the government."

The committee had subpoenaed Darden, but were unable to find him. The mysterious "little green house on K street," which the witness said the understood was owned by Edward B. McLean, the Washington publisher, again figured in the testimony as did the "shack" near Columbus, owned by Daugherty, Smith and others.

There were meetings and "deals" in both places, Miss Stinson said, "because they could be private."

Then the witness described a conversation she said she overheard between Smith and Joe Weber, the actor. It related to getting a parole for "a Mr. Solomon," the actor's brother-in-law. The talk, she said, was "how to fix it with Daugherty."

Before the committee met today Attorney General Daugherty issued another statement declaring the investigation "could be fully and finally disposed of in a week or ten days if only pertinent inquiries were made."

The attorney general also wrote to Chairman Brookhart protesting the issuance of committee subpoenas for Gaston B. Means and Thomas B. Felder, on the ground that they would receive immunity under indictment pending against them in New York.

The letter was laid before the committee, but some members were disposed to insist upon hearing Means and Felder. They are under indictment.

EAGLE POINT LAND UNDER IRRIGATION PROJECT SELLING

Completion of irrigation canals by the Eagle Point Irrigation District has started residents of Eagle Point buying land for homes.

There are several large holdings of land to be subdivided and sold at ridiculously low prices. The first of these to be placed on the market is that belonging to Luke Ryan. The six tracts sold within the few days amount to 244 acres, as follows: B. C. DeWolf, 20 acres; Charles Pettigrew, 34½ acres; D. R. Patrick, 38 acres; Elmer Robinson, 40 acres; Sam Courtney, 40 acres; W. E. Hammett, 30 acres.

Another tract of 40 acres was sold about two months ago, making a total of 284 acres that Mr. Ryan has sold this spring. The officials of the district are assisting the land owners in every way possible in disposing of their surplus lands. The land to be sold is of a very good quality and on and adjacent to the Grater Lake highway.

The main canal is completed, and the work of puddling the canal is now in progress. It is expected that water will be ready for delivery as soon after April first as needed.

The public will be invited to attend the official opening which will take place at the headquarters at Butte Falls at a date to be announced.
