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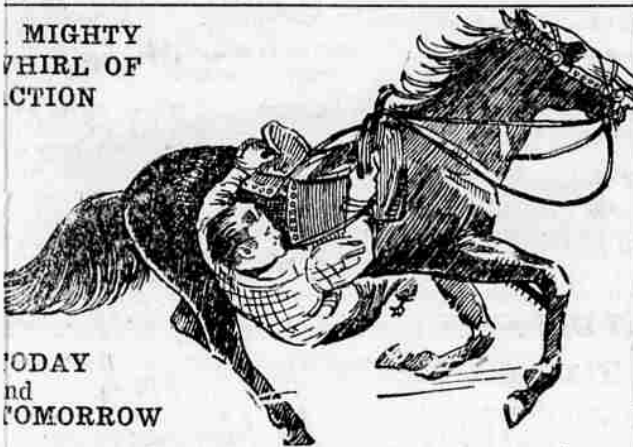

DOUBT SUICIDE OF SEATTLE WOMAN

SEATTLE, March 14.—Official investigators, who last night declared that Mrs. Virginia Clarke, wife of the credit manager of the Dexter Horton National bank of this city, had committed suicide today expressed dissatisfaction with that theory. They said that a bullet wound of which Mrs. Clarke was last night found dead in the home of a neighbor could not have taken the direction it did if she had been standing when she received it.

Burglars had recently visited the house where Mrs. Clarke was found and from which its regular occupants were absent, investigators learned and Mrs. Clarke feared their return when she visited the place.

BANKER SCROGGINS ON STAND AT TRIAL

PORTLAND, Ore., March 14.—Stephen L. Scroggin, former president of the National Bank of Sheridan, took the stand in his own behalf in federal court where he is on trial charged with irregularities. He sketched the history of the bank, which he had founded, and told of his banking methods.

One of the indictments against him was that he had transferred personal property to the bank's name and that he had used the bank's money to pay the taxes on it.

He admitted he had done this, but said that the transfer had been made to facilitate his handling of his property, and that he had never had a chance to pick out just how much of the tax payments had been on the bank's property and of his own.

40 INJURED, WRECK EASTERN TRAIN

WORCESTER, Mass., March 14.—Thirty to forty persons were reported seriously injured in a wreck of a Worcester to Providence express train at Whitinsville, Mass., this afternoon.

OREGON CONVICT, A LIFE TERMER, HELD BANK BANDIT

SALEM, Ore., March 14.—Tom O'Brien, alias "One-eyed" Tom Gray, who was indicted in Los Angeles yesterday on a charge of being implicated in the robbery of the Arcadia National bank, is in the Oregon state penitentiary doing a life term. His career in the Oregon prison has been a varied one and includes a seven year period of freedom dating from an escape in 1917. Gray emphatically denies that he was implicated in the California robbery. He declares he was working with a construction crew in Nebraska at the time and that he can prove an alibi.

Gray was convicted in Multnomah county on a charge of robbery armed with a dangerous weapon and was received at the Oregon penitentiary November 17, 1912 to serve life. He was 25 years old at the time. He was made a trustee December 28, 1916, and March 26, 1917, escaped from the prison farm. He was never heard from again until a few months ago when he was picked up as a suspect at Thermopolis, Wyo. He was identified by prison records and returned to the Oregon prison November 28 last.

MORE BODIES TAKEN FROM UTAH MINE

CASTLE GATE, Utah, March 14.—Exploration last night of the south end of the Utah Fuel company mine No. 2, where 173 miners were entombed Saturday morning, resulted in the finding of 22 additional bodies, bringing the total recovered up to 163. Every part of the mine now has been explored and there are ten bodies yet missing.

Fresh crews have been called to take up the work and a thorough search of the entire mine has been started in an effort to locate the ten missing bodies.

Whether the ten bodies will be found in nooks and corners or whether the bodies have been burned by the various fires which have occurred in the mine during the week cannot be ascertained until the crews make further search.

CALIFORNIA DEMAND FOR LOCAL HAY

As a matter of interest to the farmers and hay dealers in the Rogue River valley, on account of the continued drought in California there is a considerable demand for hay in the Sacramento and San Joaquin valleys, as well as the extreme southern part of the state. Owing to this unusual condition existing in that territory, the Southern Pacific company is publishing some new rates that will enable the Rogue River valley farmers to move hay from this territory in competition with the production in other sections.
