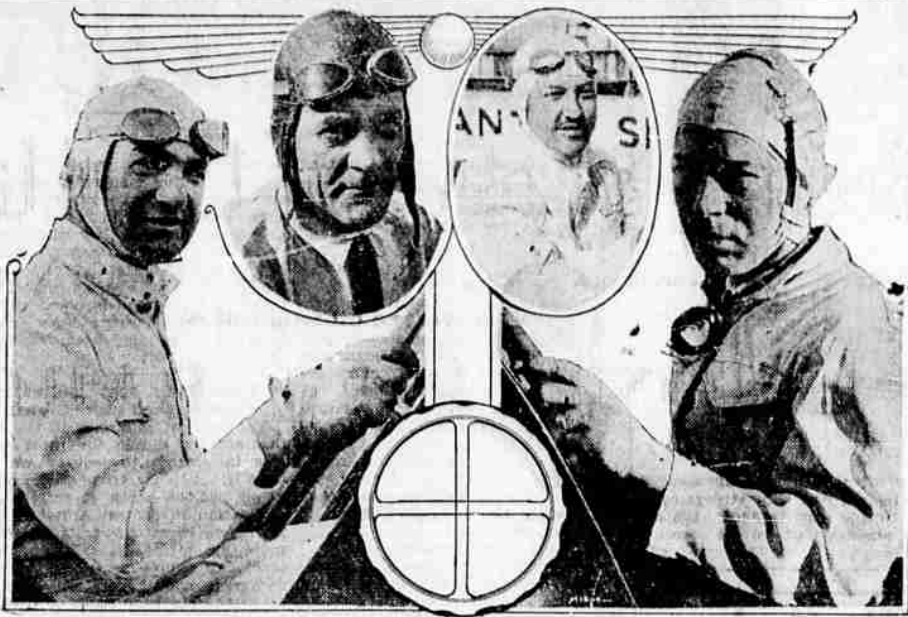

Ralph DePalma Premier Speed Demon Arrives in Medford Predicts Breaking the World's Record Sunday

Thrilling short dashes on the dirt track, the height of automobile race excitement, will be held at the Medford Fair Grounds track on Sunday, September 14.

The Jackson County Fair association has succeeded in arranging for the appearance of the world's famous speed demons.

Ralph DePalma, the great Italian pilot, and idol of the speedways, arrived in the city today and after an inspection of the local track ventured the opinion that it is the fastest dirt track in the west and that some of the records of long standing will be smashed here on Sunday.

Eddie Hearne, winner of the 1923 championship of America, is expected to reach the city this evening. Hearne's new dirt track car arrived in the city this morning and is on display at the Mason Motor Car Co., Flint dealers.

"Babe" Stapp, the youthful demon of the speedway who has had such a meteoric rise to fame in the world of speed is also in the city and will turn several fast practise laps at the track this afternoon. This newest star is expected to finish well up in the money at the coming meet. Several other

fast cars are expected to arrive in the city in the next day or two and with their arrival the fastest cars in the world will be in the city until after the race.

Mighty stiff competition will be afforded the invaders by the local boys. Intense interest is centered around the local drivers as this will be their first opportunity to show what they can do in fast company and that they will run true to expectation is the opinion of those who know racing.

The fact that the local speed kinks are accustomed to the local track and that their mounts are peculiarly adapted to dirt track racing is a big advantage.

Intense interest has been aroused by the rapid racing fans of Medford over the announcement today, that the speedy Duesenberg of George Lott would be driven by Mark Owens.

"Duesie" has been hopped up considerably and with the masterful driving of Owens should give the world's speed kings the race of the year. Geo. Smyth, "The Flying Swede" is also expected to furnish many a thrill and will be out there at all times to uphold the local reputation.

The most formidable array of speed demons ever congregated together on a dirt track will face starter Art Klein on Sunday and without doubt the most spectacular race of the northwest will be witnessed by the spectators. The list of entries received to date consist of the following:
