

LA FOLLETTE BACK AT WISCONSIN FARM TO GET VERDICT

MADISON, Wis., Nov. 3.—(By the Associated Press.)—Senator Robert M. La Follette, resting today at his home on Maple Bluff farm, after a month of strenuous campaigning, expressed gratification over late reports from supporters of his presidential candidacy throughout the country.

Combined with an exhibition of confidence in the outcome of the election was an appeal to the electorate to "increase the progressive group in congress."

The election of progressives to the house and senate is of vital concern to the people," he said in a formal public statement.

Senator La Follette's homecoming yesterday, his first visit to Madison since his nomination for the presidency in July, was made a gala occasion for his friends and supporters from all sections of the state.

A crowd of several thousand greeted him with waves of cheers and applause at the railroad station. An impromptu parade centered about his automobile and thousands of enthusiastic townspeople shrieked their welcome from the side lines along the route to the La Follette homestead three miles from the city.

Persisting at the insistence of the throng massed at the state capitol, where he was presented to the assembly by Governor John L. Brainerd, Senator La Follette expressed feelings of pleasure at "being back among all you folks."

From the state house Senator La Follette motored directly to his farm, where he will rest until after the election.

Hundreds of friends besieged the homestead during the early afternoon and evening and when the tired campaigner's day was done he had shaken the hands of more than 2,000 callers.

Senator La Follette was accompanied to Madison by his two sons, Robert, Jr., and Philip. The latter is a candidate for county prosecutor of Dane county, the first elective office held by his father 44 years ago.

Senator La Follette, with members of his family, will receive election returns in the governor's suite in the capitol Tuesday night.

SAVE IOWA FROM RADICALS, ISSUE

DES MOINES, Iowa, Nov. 3.—An apathetic interest in the Iowa state ticket, such as has not been observed in many years, predicated by republican, democratic and progressive headquarters that success will attend them tomorrow and an increasing hopefulness on the part of the democrats that their senatorial candidate, Daniel F. Steek, will defeat Senator Smith W. Brookhart, marked the 1924 campaign drama in Iowa as the curtain was rung down today.

The only deviation from the confident statements issued from political headquarters was the intimation of E. J. Feuling, democratic state chairman that unless Iowa voters cast their ballot for John W. Davis, "to save the state from LaFollette," Iowa may be carried by the Wisconsin senator.

The democrats predicted that Mr. Steek "will save the state from Brookhart."

PRESIDENT TO CLOSE CAMPAIGN TONIGHT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—The final day of the campaign found President Coolidge with only routine business on his program, except for completion of the election eve address he will deliver over the radio tonight to the voters of the nation.

This speech, expected to be devoted to an appeal to citizens to cast their ballots, will be broadcast to practically every section of the country by an extensive radio system arranged by the republican national committee.

Telegrams continued to pour into the White House today from farm organizations in response to the request of Mr. Coolidge for recommendations as to a successor to the late Secretary Wallace. He hopes from these names to be able to select a secretary who will bring with him the confidence of a large majority of agriculturists.

FINAL APPEAL FOR LA FOLLETTE MADE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—A final appeal to the voters by William H. Johnston, chairman to the conference for progressive political action, was issued today by LaFollette-Wheelwright campaign headquarters.

"A vote for the candidates of either old party," he said, "means the perpetuation of monopoly, the pauperization of the American people and the final catastrophe of war."

"A vote for the progressive candidates means the end of monopoly, a higher standard of living and a guarantee of world peace."

The campaign, he said has been fought for the first time in years on real issues.

MOTORING BLOW TO FAMOUS HOSPICE

PARIS, Nov. 3.—Increased auto-motoring has been chiefly responsible for the decision of the great St. Bernard hospice to open a hotel.

For nearly a thousand years food and shelter have been freely given to all travelers who have halted at the famous hospice which is noted for the life saving dogs attached to it. No payment was ever asked but the church contains a box for voluntary offerings. For a long time these offerings have not been in any way in proportion to the number of visitors, ever growing, owing to increased motor touring in the Alps.

It now is proposed to meet the deficiency by turning a part of the building into a hotel and place it in the charge of a professional manager.

KLAN CURSED CITY NORMAL AGAIN

NILES, Ohio, Nov. 3.—With peace and order restored here military, county and city officials today turned their attention to fixing the responsibility for Saturday's rioting between the Ku Klux Klan and the anti-klansmen which occurred while klansmen were preparing to parade.

The list of known wounded as the result of skirmishes remained at 13. Only a comparatively few National Guardsmen remained on duty. Most of these, Major General Benson W. Hough, in charge of the city proclaimed under qualified martial law by Governor Donahy after rioting began, said would be home in time to cast their ballots in tomorrow's election.

Investigation into the rioting was started by military authorities yesterday. Twenty arrests were made yesterday, most of them on charges of intoxication.
