OBITUARY

JANES—The funeral of Wm. D. Janes, who passed away at his home in Saginaw, Mich., November 6, will be held from the West funeral home on Thursday, November 13, at 2:30 p. m., Rev. E. P. Lawrence officiating. Interment L. O. O. F. cemetery. 200

Mr. Janes was born in Erie, Pa., Jan. 26, 1852. His boyhood was spent there, where later he engaged in business. He married Alice M. Dickinson, also of Erie. 200

They removed to Bradford, Pa., in 1881. His father, Herman Janes, was the first partner of James Tarr, the first pioneer in the Pennsylvania oil fields, and he evolved the name "Standard Oil." The Tarr farm, developing several rich oil strikes, was sold to the group which later became incorporated under the name "Standard Oil Co." in later years Mr. W. D. Janes removed with his family to Saginaw, Mich., where he engaged in the manufacture of shade rollers, with factories in Bay City and Saginaw. 200
