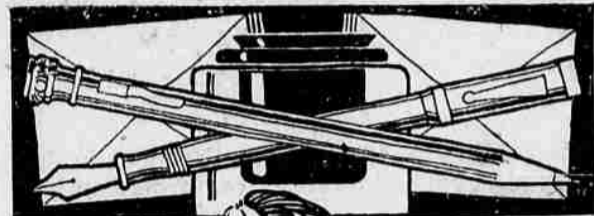

GIBBONS MAKES SHORT WORK OF BALTIMORE KID

NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—(By the Associated Press)—Tommy Gibbons, St. Paul light-heavyweight, gained another notch in his climb to pugilistic fame last night when he blotted from his path Kid Norfolk, Baltimore negro, in the sixth round of a fifteen round match.

The St. Paul boxer scored a technical knockout, the referee stopping the match after 55 seconds of fighting in the sixth round after Norfolk had been lowered to the canvas three times.

A capacity crowd of 13,000 paid the Christmas fund a net profit of \$46,000 to see the card.

Employing short, cutting jabs with few straight punches, Gibbons carried the fight to Norfolk at the start; kept on top of him during the infighting and then to vary his attack stepped back occasionally and launched a furious attack from long range, which all but knocked the negro into submission.

Down for a count of two in the fourth round, down again in the fifth for a count of four, and again in the sixth for a count of six, Norfolk got up from the third fall, staggered a short way across the ring and stretched himself horizontally again without a blow from Gibbons.

One of the largest crowds in the history of the garden attended the match, the proceeds of which went to swell a Christmas fund organized by a New York newspaper.

STANFORD STARTS INTENSIVE DRIVE FOR NOTRE DAME

PALO ALTO, Dec. 10.—The Stanford football team, returning to practice this week, is preparing intensively for the encounter with the notable Notre Dame eleven at Pasadena, New Year's day.

Ernie Nevers, premier fullback of the 1923 season is expected to start the game. He was hurt in a pre-season scrimmage and has been skirting the side lines on crutches most of the time since. He played part of two games, but was injured again in the Montana contest and could not get into the big game with California.

Blake Thomas, an end, is reported to have recovered from the injury that kept him on the bench most of the season.

Forced to do without Nevers, Coach Glenn Warner has developed two more excellent fullbacks during the season, Hey and Bogue. They are likely to step into the Notre Dame game at some stage. Nevers' ankles still are so weak that it is questionable whether he will play much of the game. Though Hey and Bogue have proved smashing plungers, Nevers' thorough work on defense has been missed.

Warner is drilling the team especially for a defense against passes, anticipating Rockne air attacks. The Stanford teacher also is said to have evolved a few tricks for the special benefit of the Irish team.

O. A. C. to Play in Wisconsin Next Year

KLAMATH F. BANK ROBBER GUILTY

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Dec. 10.—W. P. Richards, former hotel manager at Klamath Falls, Ore., and Joe Duncan, a negro, were sentenced to serve from five years to life in San Quentin prison after a jury convicted them in the Yolo county superior court yesterday on a charge of robbing the Woodland branch of the Bank of Italy of \$12,142 September 29.

Christmas Mail Costly WASHINGTON, Dec. 10.—Between 40,000 and 50,000 extra employees will be required to handle the peak load of Christmas mail this year postal authorities today estimated. The extra cost was estimated at \$2,500,000.

OVER 10,000 CARS OF LUMBER SOLD IN BEND, OREGON

BEND, Ore., Dec. 10.—A total of 10,109 carloads of lumber were shipped out of Bend by the Brooks-Scanlon and Shevlin-Hixon mills during 1924, according to figures announced yesterday. The shipments included lumber, lath, roller shade stock and box shooks.

The Shevlin-Hixon company which shipped 6000 carloads of lumber into 40 different states, shipped the greatest number of cars into Iowa and Minnesota, New York, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin and Michigan next in order. No lumber was exported.

The Brooks-Scanlon Lumber company sent 4479 carloads into 37 states, District of Columbia, China and Cuba. Michigan with 935 cars received the greatest number of cars. New York state was second with 721. One lone car of Deschutes pine was sent into Tennessee, the heart of the southern pine country. Massachusetts, on the far eastern coast received 113 cars and Connecticut 126.

The figures are complete for the first eleven months of the year with December's shipments estimated on the basis of November. The shipments by states are actual figures with no estimates.

The two mills cut 358,000,000 feet of logs during 1924 which is an increase of ninety million over 1923.

While a shutdown at some time during the year is necessary for the repair of machinery, it is planned to postpone such a shutdown until perhaps bad weather will make it desirable to shut down.

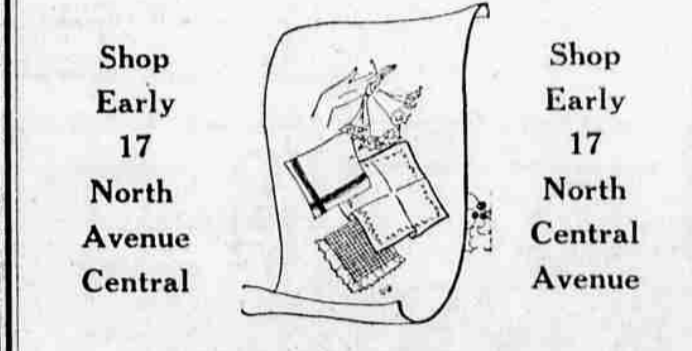

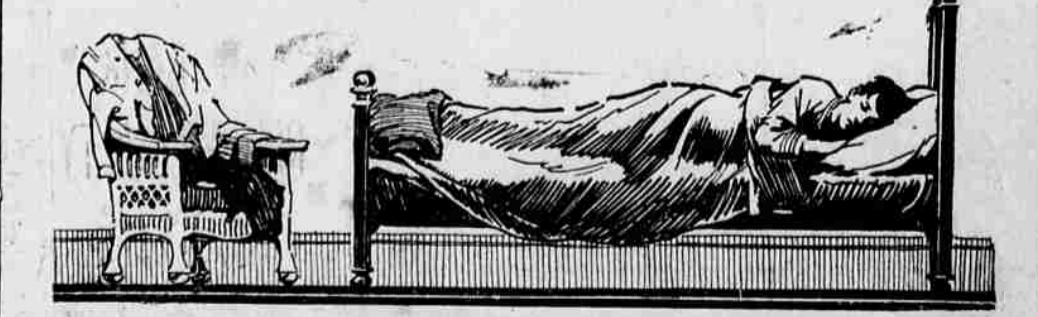
