At the joint session of the delegates it was decided to organize the school board members of Jackson county. W. J. Freeman was elected chairman, J. E. Weaver, vice chairman, and R. E. Nealon, secretary.

Indeed it was a great opportunity for the members of school boards to hear such an expert on questions of school administration.

WALKER WINS IN M'TIGUE BOUT

NEWARK, N. J., Jan. 8.—(By the Associated Press.)—Mickey Walker, Welterweight champion of the world, would be holding another crown today had he boxed Mike McTigue, world's light heavyweight champion, in New York state last night. Walker defeated the king of the 175-pounders in the opinion of newspapermen at the ringside, in a tame twelve round contest, but the boxing laws of New Jersey forbid a decision. As a result Walker is still champion only in his decision despite the fact that he beat McTigue decisively.

GRIDIRON STAR OF YALE, DIVORCED

PARIS, Jan. 8.—(By the Associated Press.)—A divorce was granted by the French courts today to Sophia Meltrim Coy from Edward Harris Coy (Ted Coy) the former Yale football star. The two children of the couple are given into the mother's guardianship. The divorce was granted on the grounds of desertion. Mr. and Mrs. Coy were married in Asheville, N. C., in 1913.

SPURT BRIEFS

Emil "Irish" Meusel, Giant's outfielder, said to be sought by the Browns of the American league, is far from being wanted out of the National New York club. Meusel has been mentioned as part of several trades this winter but, according to Secretary Joe Tierney, he remains a full fledged member of the Giant's payroll.

Young Stribling, Georgia school boy light weight, will meet a formidable foe in boxing Jimmy Delaney of St. Paul, a protégé of Mike Gibbons, at Grand Rapids, Mich., January 21. Delaney made Gene Tunney, American light heavyweight champion, step at top speed to win shade decisions. Delaney boxes with the same speed and puzzling style that made Gibbons the phantom of the ring.

Halfback "Red" Grange, flashy Illinois football player, chosen for all-American honors on all mythical elevens, without a doubt was the outstanding star of the 1924 season. In the opinion of Major John L. Griffith, commissioner of athletics in the western conference, Griffith referred a dozen games and talked with coaches from all sections of the country before arriving at this conclusion. He says Grange's achievement in scoring four touchdowns against Michigan on long, thrilling runs in less than twelve minutes after the start of the game, was the outstanding individual performance of the season.

(By the Associated Press) Knute Rockne's galloping horsemen trotted close to half the circumference of the earth in quest of football honors during the past season. They visited states in climates ranging from forty degrees above at Princeton, N. J., to ninety degrees above at Pasadena, Cal. In winning ten games from representatives in every section of the country, Notre Dame traveled 10,500 miles. One sixth of the season was spent in Pullman cars. Three of the games—Army, Princeton and Stanford—take in railroad mileage of more than 9000 miles.
