

G. O. P. REQUESTS LEGISLATURE TO CHANGE PRIMARY

The republican party organization in Jackson county has forwarded the following resolution to the Jackson county delegation in the Oregon legislature:

Whereas, the Oregon direct primary law was adopted for the purpose of curing the defects, real and imaginary, that had developed thru the operation of the political convention system; and

Whereas, we believe that the affairs of a representative republic, such as ours, should be administered through and by responsible majority parties, and that these majority political parties should be encouraged, protected and fostered through the enactment of proper electoral safeguards; and

Whereas, the present direct primary law is destructive of party solidarity, party spirit, and party loyalty, from the fact that it does not make specific provision whereby political parties can hold representative delegate conventions for the purpose of declaring the principles and policies of the party, and selecting capable men and women to be voted for by the electorate in the primary; and

Whereas, after twenty years of trial the weakness of our present primary law is recognized by thoughtful citizens of all political parties; it encourages rule by block minorities, and secret or concealed political groups upon whom responsibility can not be fixed; the incapable and the unfit, the demagogue and the self-seeker in many cases thrust themselves into public office. There is no thought or care given to the selection of our public servants, with resultant inefficiency and waste in the administration of our affairs; and

Whereas, we believe the time has come when a vast majority of the electorate of the state of Oregon are demanding a reasonable and friendly revision of our direct primary law to the end that representative responsible government shall be strengthened and upheld;

Therefore be it resolved, that the duty elected and appointed officers of the Jackson county republican organization do hereby instruct our legislative delegation to take the proper steps to amend our primary law in the following respects:

First, to provide for representative delegate party conventions, to be held prior to the date set for the primary election. The purpose of these conventions being to draft platforms of principles and to recommend suitable candidates for office to be voted on in the May primary. Also to select delegates to the state and district conventions.

Second, to provide for holding an election to select delegates to these party conventions, and to provide that in all cases the lawfully elected precinct committeemen or county organizations shall be the foundation on which these conventions will be built. And that they automatically become members of the party conventions, with exactly the same powers and duties as the regularly elected delegates.

NO HORSES ARE STARVING IN EAGLE POINT DISTRICT

Charges of cruelty to horses, pastured on the "desert" contained in a communication to a Portland paper last Saturday, are denied by Dr. E. H. French, county humane officer, and Mrs. Glenn Fabrick, secretary. Both resent the fact that the writer did not give his name, and did not see the proper authorities before taking pen in hand, to address the metropolitan press.

Dr. French says that as soon as he read the article, he investigated, and finds the horses are in charge of Dr. Gitzon, and that when he went to find the horses, to see how they were making out, he could not locate them. The horses are impounded stock. It is also said that while the stock was not overfed, neither were they starving.

Dr. French also states that humane work is sadly crippled in this vicinity, by the lack of interest and finances. In four years \$10 has been given to the cause, and they have the promise of another dollar. He asks if anybody is interested in making life easier for dumb brutes, they give what they can to the work.

TREMENDOUS CROWDS ATTEND MEETINGS LAW ENFORCEMENT

Two immense audiences of 1100 people viewed the five reel photoplay, "When Right Meets Might," and heard Chas. J. Hall last night at the First Methodist church. With the auditorium of the church seated and packed to capacity and the overflow crowd of four hundred and fifty in the recreation hall, and a number left standing in both places, the law enforcement rally fulfilled all expectations.

In the afternoon at the Presbyterian church Mr. Hall was presented to a record attendance which taxed the capacity of the church. For an hour and a half he held the audience which was many times convulsed with laughter by his sallies of wit. SENATORS START SPRING TRAINING WITH MANY VETS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—(By the Associated Press)—With the cry in other cities for young blood, Clark Griffith, proud president of a world's championship baseball club, expected to hold his team at the top by throwing all precedent to the winds and injecting into his lineup a sprinkling of tried veterans for the 1925 campaign.

Manager Stanley Harris will take to Tampa for spring training a pitching staff whose mainstays have been for years familiar figures on major league fields. In addition to Walter Johnson, the mound crew will include George Moxridge and Tom Zachary, last year's southpaw bulwark; Dutch Ruether, obtained from Brooklyn; Stanley Coveleski, bought from Cleveland; Vean Gregg, the veteran from Seattle; Fred Mathery, brilliant relief hurler last year; Charley Ogden, Joe Martina, Paul Zahner, Benson Brillhart, Alf Russell, another relief pitcher; Kelly, a recruit from Memphis; James McNamara, obtained from Wichita, Kas., and several others.

The club, according to Griffith and Harris has been greatly bolstered in reserve strength. Weakness in this respect almost lost the world's series for the team and immediately after the championship they began efforts to build up a machine which would run more smoothly in the face of injuries.

Mike McNally, former Yankee substitute infielder, was obtained in a deal with the Boston Red Sox in which Third Baseman Prothero was sent to Boston. Spencer Adams, a Pacific Coast league shortstop, also was bought. These two with Judge Harris, Peckinbaugh, Bluege and Shirley will make up the infield eligibles. In the outfield, Rice, Goslin, McNeeley, Matthews, Carlyle, leading Southern association hitter last season, Leftel and Hinchart, a South Atlantic league recruit, are available. Rice and Goslin will have no trouble holding their jobs, but McNeeley is expected to have a hot fight, despite his great work of last season and his \$50,000 bid that won the last game of the world's series.

Bystanders picked up the victims and sent them to the hospital.

Local Insurance Firm Adds New Equipment

In the endeavor to safeguard its records against fire with the best protection possible the M-Curdy-Daniels Insurance Agency recently installed, in its office one of the finest safe cabinets manufactured, being next to the largest of its kind constructed, and weighing a little over 2000 pounds.

Late model safe cabinets differ from the old-fashioned iron safes in being built for large storage capacity with little more weight than ordinary-sized safes. The safe bears what is known as the "Fire Underwriter's laboratory A label," which calls for a test in a furnace for four hours at three thousand degrees Fahrenheit, after which it is subjected to a thirty foot drop onto a concrete slab and an additional furnace test of eighteen hundred and fifty degrees for one hour, upside down, without reaching three hundred degrees inside. As paper burned at four hundred degrees, the test is claimed to be severe enough to preserve the contents in any fire.

The safe is used for the benefit of clients' insurance policies as well as for the office records and was shipped from the factory of the General Fire Proofing company at Youngstown, Ohio, by the Medford Book Store.
