

# TRIAL OF RAJAH BLACKMAILER IN ENGLAND STARTS

LONDON, Jan. 21.—William Cooper Hobbs, one of the prominent figures in the recent Robinson suit involving the rajah, Sir Hari Singh and a so-called blackmailing plot against the Indian potentate, was committed for trial recently by a Bow street magistrate on charge of "stealing a check for 15,000 pounds, stolen abroad," and with being connected with a conspiracy to mule the rajah.

The defendant, answering the charges denied that he had ever attempted to blackmail the East Indian prince and declared that the accusations made against him by Montague Noel Newton, who testified in the Robinson case that Hobbs was one of the ring leaders in the blackmailing plot, were false.

Hobbs was arrested November 28 at Gravesend just as he was about to embark on the steamship Rotterdam.

# SPANISH AUTHOR PUTS FRANCE "IN BAD"

PARIS, Jan. 21.—(By the Associated Press)—The offensive against the present regime in Spain waged by Vicente Blasco Ibañez, the Spanish author, has placed the French government in a more embarrassing situation than the Spanish directorate.

Recent developments in the French parliament have made it seem clear that the Herriot cabinet will either have to make a complete retreat from the stand it has taken on the prosecution of Ibañez under the French law for his attacks on King Alfonso, or fall. The entire socialist party of 165 members is pledged to vote for the bill introduced in the chamber of deputies yesterday calling for repeal of the law under the provisions of which the prosecution of Ibañez was begun.

The proceedings were instituted after the Spanish ambassador had made representations to Premier Herriot.

# MANY PLANS OFFERED ANENT WORLD COURT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—American adherence to the world court, first proposed to congress two years ago, was up today for consideration by the senate foreign relations committee. Proponents were pressing for an early report to the senate where one proposal already is on the calendar.

Residing this proposal, offered by Senator Pepper, republican, Pennsylvania for the creation of a new court independent of the League of Nations two others have been advanced, one by Senator Swanson of Virginia, ranking democrat on the committee and the other by Senator Willis, republican, Ohio.

Both of these proposals contain the reservations suggested by Secretary Hughes and approved by both President Harding and President Coolidge.

**Klamath Favors Increase.**  
KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Jan. 21.—Endorsement of the legislative bill increasing salaries of district attorneys throughout the state was voted unanimously today noon by the directors of the Klamath county chamber of commerce.

# FATHER CHARGED WITH MURDER OF SON FOR MONEY

MILWAUKEE, Jan. 21.—Arthur Hausfeldt will be arraigned in district court today on a charge of murdering his three-year-old son, Roy, who died a week ago from what has been ascertained to be poison.

Hausfeldt was arrested yesterday on a charge of murder, following an investigation into the death of the child.

The child was heir to about \$15,000 left in trust for him by his mother, who died in 1923.

In the event of the child's death, the bequest provided the estate was to go to Arthur Hausfeldt.

# WOULD PLACE ALL STATE COMMISSIONS UNDER BUDGET PLAN

STATE HOUSE, SALEM, Jan. 21.—All state commissions and boards at present not under the budget system will be placed there if a bill to be introduced by Representative North, Multnomah county, becomes a law.

The measure North has drawn would place all boards and commissions under the budget plan. Their expenditures would be stipulated and provided for by legislative appropriation. North explains that his bill is in line with an economy program.

Under the bill surplus finances received by any commission or department over and above expenses would revert to the general fund.

The industrial accident commission, fish commission, game, highway commissions, the dental board and many others would be affected. The measure would have the effect of reducing the tendency of various commissions and boards to earn and expend more money than absolutely necessary. North pointed out.

# CHURCHMAN FAVORS AIDING NEWSPAPER

CHICAGO, Jan. 20.—Newspapers are showing increased interest in church news and the church should reciprocate by studying the viewpoint of editor, reporter and press associations, Dr. R. J. Wade, executive secretary, told the world service commission of the Methodist Episcopal church at its annual sessions here today.

"American newspapers," Dr. Wade said, "are printing more religious editorials than hitherto and are paying more attention to news of church and missions."

"Same, safe, adequate, consistent publicity plays an important part in any worthwhile enterprise. To frown upon it is unwise, to omit it is weakening, to default it entirely is folly, but to use it skillfully is expanding."

**Forty-one Women Lawyers in England**  
LONDON, Jan. 21.—When seven women candidates were called to the bar a few days ago they brought the total number of female barristers practicing in England to 41.

Among the 99 candidates called on this occasion were one American citizen and a citizen of Russia. No rule exists preventing foreign subjects from being called to the English bar.

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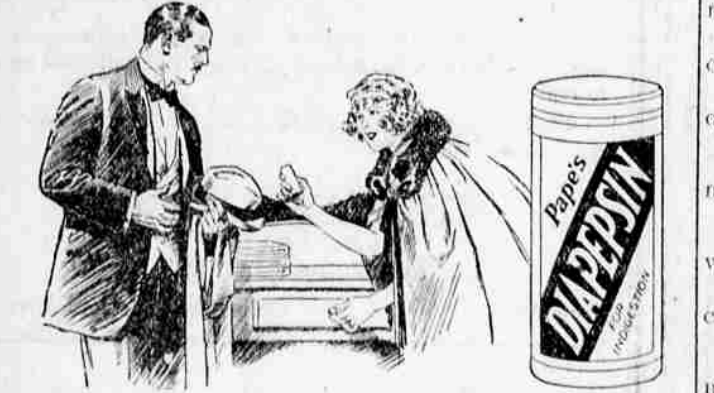
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
