Test was made on the basis of 2 lbs. Sherwin-Williams dry sulphur to 1 gallon commercial liquid. Volume 1, No. 7, Department of Agriculture, State of California.

SNOW NOW 18 FT. AT RIM OF LAKE

It has been snowing hard for some time past at Crater National Park, according to the telephonic report received at the park headquarters office here this morning by Superintendent C. G. Thomson from Peter Oard, the park ranger, and it was still snowing at the time.

Up to then the depth of snow at the park was 18 feet at the rim of Crater Lake, and 12 feet at Anna Spring camp. This quantity of snow at the park contains almost twice the water content of snow there in recent years.

This means that it is well packed down and frozen, and hence while it will last longer before coming down into the valley in the shape of water next summer, the task of opening the roads through the park from the entrances to the lodge in time for the season's opening July 1st next, will be consequently more difficult than for years.
