The new regulation allows owners of land in designated areas adjacent to the reserves to exchange their property for timber within the national forest. The system employed is either to offer a certain amount of cut over land for the forest service timber, which will be appraised, or to allow the forest service officials to set a price for the land. The timber is then appraised and an exchange offer made by the forest service.
