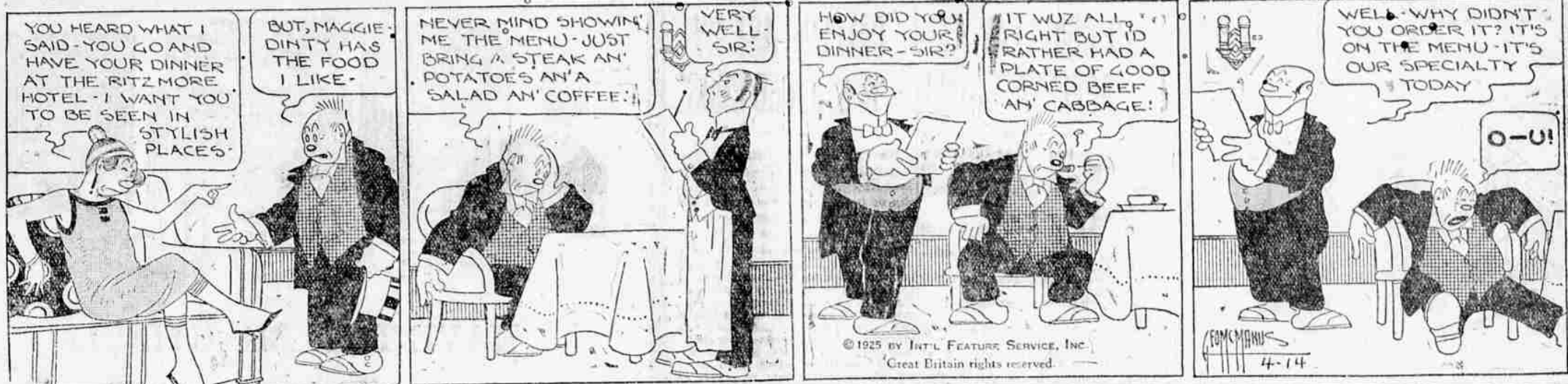


BRINGING UP FATHER



DOUKHOBORS TO CROWN SON OF SLAIN MAN KING

SASKATOON, Sask., April 14.—Great preparations are being made to welcome Peter Verigin, Jr., who became king of the Doukhobors after his father was killed in an explosion on a train in British Columbia when he returned from Russia. It was learned here today from M. W. Czakoff, vice-president and general manager of the Christian Community of Universal Brotherhood, Ltd.

"Young Verigin will be the great spiritual leader of his people and he will not have any business worries to distract him," said Czakoff. "He is well educated along spiritual lines having left Canada shortly after his arrival with his father to attend the University of Tiflis, in the Caucasus, Russia.

"We like Canada and the government of the dominion. There is no truth in reports that we are leaving for other climes for we are satisfied. We intend to keep all the land we have and in the future the Doukhobor colony will enlarge the settlements."

NO RESTRICTIONS ON DRUGS FOR CURES

WASHINGTON, April 14.—Physicians in prescribing narcotics to addicts are not required to restrict the quantity called for by their prescriptions to small doses for strictly curative purposes when the narcotics are to be self-administered by the addict, the supreme court held today in a case from Spokane, Wash., brought by Dr. Charles O. Linder.

In the lower courts the government won its contention that when the narcotics are to be self-administered the physician can prescribe the only quantity that will be curative of the habit and not place sufficient narcotics in the hands of the addict to enable him to become a seller of narcotics or to administer to himself doses larger than those necessary to effect a cure.

U. S. BUSINESS MEN TO ATTEND TRADE MEETING

WASHINGTON, April 14.—Problems involved in furthering the economic restoration of countries not yet recovered from the shock of war will have first place on the program of the third biennial conference of the international chamber of commerce to be held at Brussels June 21-27.

An outline of the completed program as made public today by the American section of the chamber showed that the conference, at which forty nations will be represented also will take up a number of specific questions with the purpose of facilitating international trade by standardizing and simplifying commercial practices.

It was estimated that the American delegation will include more than 200 representative bankers, financiers and industrialists.
