

TRAGIC DEATH OF MRS. ANNA MILLER SHOCKS ASHLAND

ASHLAND, April 14.—(Special)—Mrs. Anna Miller whose tragic death occurred at Newcastle, Penn., the night of April 13, according to telegraphic news, lived in Ashland for five years, making her home with her relatives, Mr. and Mrs. Ira Leslie, removing with them to Eugene two years ago when they went there to place their children in school. Mrs. Leslie was a niece of Mrs. Miller. Mrs. Miller was a niece of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Reed, of 298 Avery street, and a sister of A. C. Keller of this city. A sister, Mrs. Lillie Campbell, lives in Portland. The relatives at whose home she was a guest, visited the Reeds and other relatives last summer, spending some time here. Mr. W. H. Weinschenck was president of the National Vegetable Growers association of Newcastle. Relatives in Ashland had received no particulars of the tragedy up until late this evening. At first they hoped that it must be a mistake. But there seems no reason to doubt the tragic news. The sympathy of the community is given the relatives in this shocking tragedy. Mrs. Miller had a host of friends who are saddened at her death.

LATE COLONEL RAY GREAT FACTOR IN LOCAL PROSPERITY

Colonel Frank H. Ray, who died at his home at Huntington, N. Y., near New York City last Saturday, was widely known throughout southern Oregon, and scores of local people remember him well for his geniality and friendliness, and sincerely mourn his passing.

He spent considerable time in this valley during the "boom days" and gave liberally to works of civic movements at the time, and was a colony of George Putnam, now editor of the Salem Capital-Journal, Evan Reames, Dr. J. P. Reddy, Moss Barkdull and dozens of others identified with Medford activities 15 years ago.

Colonel Ray, at the time of his death, was a very wealthy man, having retired from active business life several years ago. He was the owner of a patent in the Ray-cycle bicycle, and he delighted to tell of the financial hardships encountered by himself and partner, in placing their invention upon the market. It afterwards formed the foundation of his start in the business world.

The master achievement of his life, was the formation of the Consolidated Tobacco company, afterwards absorbed by the American Tobacco company. Colonel Ray worked nine months on the project, and was apparently confronted with failure. He and his wife went to Europe for a rest and vacation. When he returned to New York City the deal was closed in three days. His business ability won him recognition throughout the east and in the early days he probably did more for the development of Medford and the Rogue River valley than any other one man.

COURT HALL SEES RECORD CROP OF PEARS THIS YEAR

According to Court Hall, who has made his annual guess of the fruit crop, there will be in the neighborhood of 2500 cars of pears and apples shipped out of the Rogue River valley this year. He forecasts 2200 of pears, and 300 of apples. "This is a highly favorable outlook," said Mr. Hall, who bases his prognostications on what he has heard from fruitgrowers, and it looks like we would have a big crop of Bartlett's, and a light crop of Doves and Nellis. It is just naturally a light year for Nellis and Doves. You can't make much of a guess, however, until after the drop and the frost, but it looks the best I've seen in a long time."

"There will be about 300 cars of apples shipped from the valley. Apples are getting to be a minor consideration here, and lots of apple trees have been pulled up this spring. They are centering on pears, and they can't raise enough of them."

Mr. Hall says that the worst of the frost danger has passed and that orchards in the north end of the valley that were hard hit last year will be big producers this season.

NEW OREGON GAME HEAD TO OUTLINE COMMISSION PLANS

At 6:30 tomorrow night the sportsmen of the valley will convene at the Hotel Medford for their annual banquet. The gala event among the fishermen and sportsmen of the region. A large delegation is coming from Klamath Falls and from Ashland, and a representative colony are coming down from Roseburg and Grants Pass. The role of sport, assures the usual big crowd.

Speakers include several headliners in state game circles. derful moving pictures of outdoor life in Oregon. Gold and stream material that is bound to start a lot of argument among the oldtimers.

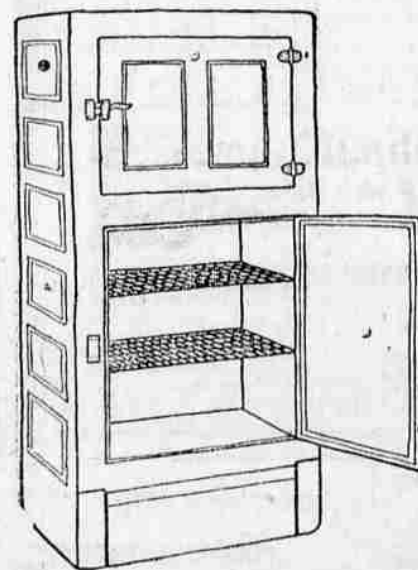

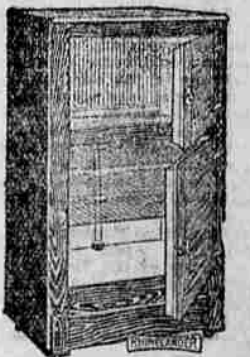
