

REPORT P. AND E. AND HOLLY ST. SITES FAVORED

Prof. Earl R. Douglas and Dr. H. P. Halsey, experts from the department of the school of education of the U. of O., who had been in Medford since Monday forenoon for the purpose of making a survey of the local conditions and sites in connection with advice on a suitable site for a new high school building, finished their survey yesterday and left on the evening train for Eugene. Their decision, which will be in the form of a written report, is expected to be received in a day or two.

The experts met with the city planning commission late yesterday afternoon, and had dinner with the members of the school board at the Hotel Medford until train time, when the local situation was discussed with these bodies.

Although the decision of the experts will not be known until it is mailed back here it is understood that in their investigations on sites, they eliminated altogether the Hutchinson-Lumden site in the southwest part of the city, and that their report will deal only with the two other proposed sites, one of which is the so-called "P. & E." site, and the other the baseball grounds tract in the Holly-Second streets locality, in the northern section, which was purchased by the school board years ago as a possible new high school site.

It is further understood that the experts will make no choice between these two sites, finding almost equal advantages and disadvantages. Therefore it is presumed according to semi-official talk heard about town today that the school board in calling for a special election to vote bonds for the construction of a new high school building, will at the same time submit these two sites to the voters.

The school board held an informal meeting last night when the situation was discussed, but no information from this meeting was given out. The special election will be called within the next few days, presumably as soon as the experts' report is received here.

One rumor extant today is that at this election the board will first ask the people to vote \$185,000 bonds to purchase a site and equipment, the precise site being selected at a subsequent election.

SOCIALIST REGIME LOOMS, BELGIUM

BRUSSELS, April 14.—(By Associated Press.) Emile Vander Veldt, socialist leader and former minister of justice was summoned by King Albert this morning and requested to form a ministry to succeed the cabinet of Premier Theunis, which resigned on April 5. Mr. Vander Veldt agreed to undertake the task.

The Theunis ministry handed its resignation to King Albert on the day that parliamentary elections were held throughout Belgium. Announcement that it would retire regardless of the outcome of the elections had been made several days previously.

The socialists gained ten parliamentary seats in the elections.

Emile Vander Veldt, for years has been the socialist leader in the chamber of deputies and has taken a prominent part in world socialist affairs.
