PAINLEVE REPORTS 'PROGRESS' ONLY

PARIS, April 16.—(By the Associated Press.)—Ex-Premier Paul Painleve, attempting the task of forming a cabinet in succession to the Herriot ministry was able only to report progress and not the definite conclusion of his task when he visited President Doumergue at the palace of Elysee this afternoon.

"If a cabinet is formed it will not be before tonight," he said. "I still have everything to do and yet do it quickly."

"I will endeavor," he added, "to form a ministry tonight and have it published in the Journal Officiel tomorrow."

M. Caillaux, upon leaving the bankers' conference stated that if Painleve formed a cabinet he would accept the portfolio of finance.
