

LOCAL PATRONS OF POSTOFFICE FAIL TO HEED CHANGE

Over a hundred private postal cards were mailed at the postoffice yesterday with insufficient postage, by residents who had evidently forgotten that the new postal rates went into effect Wednesday morning, one change in which provides that all private cards must bear postage of two cents instead of one cent as heretofore. The postoffice returned all such cards to the senders, for the required postage. The government postal card goes for one cent as before.

Also a number of people forgot that a change had been made that requires more postage in sending newspapers and the like. A number of changes have also been made in sending parcel post matter.

The rate for newspapers, magazines and other periodicals containing not more than second-class entry, is 2 cents for each two ounces up to eight ounces, and the fourth-class zone rate plus a 2-cent service charge on each parcel over eight ounces. This does not include certain increases in rates for publishers and news agents.

STORM IN EASTERN OREGON

BEND, Ore., April 16.—A heavy wind which accompanied the rain at LaPine, 35 miles south of Bend, did considerable damage to telephone lines according to reports from LaPine this morning and from the local telephone office. The damage was repaired late yesterday by the telephone company.

The rainfall between Bend and Madras was unusually heavy yesterday and last night according to reports brought in today. Water is lying on the ground all around Prineville and general rejoicing among the farmers is reported by Bend people returning from there this morning.

Crescent, beyond LaPine and to the south of Bend reported heavy rains but no wind.

The logging camps this side of LaPine reported heavy rains both yesterday and last night but little or no wind.

Fishermen returning from Twin Lakes reported heavy rains in the mountains but no wind.

PENDLETON, April 16.—According to F. D. Hall, O. W. R. and N. agent here, the Pacific Coast grain elevator at Barnhart was blown down by the storm yesterday and some damage done at Rietz. Fifteen trees were blown down there and part of the roof of the O. W. R. and N. mechanical shops was blown off.

PENDLETON, Ore., April 16.—A sharp wind struck Pendleton yesterday afternoon shortly after noon and although it did little damage in the city, reports from the country later indicated that a small house was demolished at Rietz and the top blown from a warehouse at Fulton. No one was injured, according to reports received here.

Many trees are reported to have been blown down. A heavy shower followed the wind and another rain came last night.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., April 16.—The southwest wind which yesterday and Tuesday brought torrents of rain into the Klamath basin country, continues today unabated. Prospects indicate more rain this morning with perhaps a cessation late this afternoon. Livestock men and farmers, particularly the former are rejoicing as the rain gives promise of an abundance of range grass on Klamath grazing land.

BEND, Ore., April 16.—Rainfall which was general over central Oregon all day yesterday had cleared away and bright sunshine greeted everyone today. The rain was not accompanied by wind. Clouds hanging over the Cascade rim, however, held promise of more rain.

Paris War Cripple Threatens to Kill New Cabinet Choice

PARIS, April 16.—Antoine Damesin, a war cripple was arrested today in front of the ministry of foreign affairs where M. Painleve has been holding conferences with M. Caillaux and others for the formation of a cabinet.

Damesin told the police that he had gone there "to kill Caillaux who is an assassin."

(M. Caillaux was recently granted amnesty for alleged war time commerce with the enemy.)

PUBLIC EXCLUDED FROM MANN ACT TRIAL, PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., April 16.—Annes was found guilty by the jury, which was out two minutes. The court immediately sentenced him to five years' imprisonment.

The child broke down today and cried a greater part of the morning. The witnesses against Anness were Mrs. Myrtle Deniff, the girl's mother; Mrs. Clara Upton, Mrs. Ruth Broadcloud, Delsie Burton, Elsie Patton, C. J. Miltner, C. A. McKennon, Mrs. G. McKennon, Elwin Burton, 19; Floyd Burton, 16, (brothers of the girl); C. C. Brower and C. E. Green.

While the child was on the witness stand yesterday Judge Bean ordered all from the court room save attorneys, reporters and court officers. Hundreds were turned away from the court room yesterday, and scores this morning.

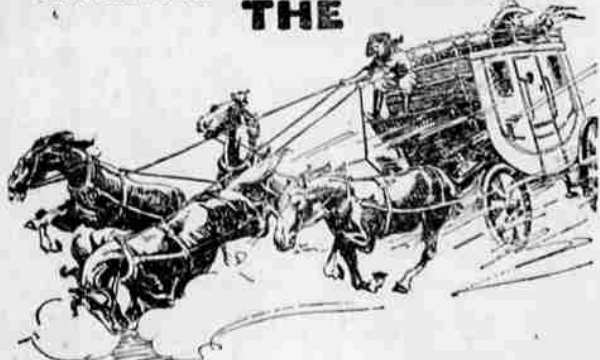
