

EUGENE VOTES TO PUT IN A NEW WATER SYSTEM

EUGENE, Ore., April 17.—Eugene voters yesterday approved bonds of \$375,000 for the proposed change of the source of city water supply from the Willamette to the McKenzie river. The vote cast in the city was fairly light and some of the other issues on the ballot were closely contested.

The survey for the change in the water supply for Eugene has already been completed and work is expected to start in the near future, according to Carl McClain, superintendent of public utilities.

Other bond issues approved at the polls yesterday were \$135,000 for the two new reservoirs, pumps and connecting pipe lines; \$50,000 for sewer re-construction, and two issues, totalling \$50,000 for street intersection paving.

Bonds which failed included \$25,000 for fire apparatus; \$10,000 for remodeling of the city hall; \$25,000 for the purchase of municipal incinerator and \$9000 for the paving of a certain street.

The fire apparatus bonds were carried last summer by a big majority, but were voted on the same ballot as the municipal auditorium bonds, now being contested through the courts. In order to hasten the payment for the fire apparatus, purchased when the other bond issue carried, the second vote was asked. The bonds lost by 11 votes.

PRIMA DONNA ASKS REDUCTION IN TAX

NEW YORK, April 17.—Alma Gluck, noted singer and wife of Efrem Zimbalist, violinist, filed suit today in the United States district court, against Charles W. Anderson, collector of internal revenue, for \$5000 excess income tax which she claims she paid in 1917. Miss Gluck contends that she was assessed on royalties which should not have come under taxation.

WASHINGTON TOWN NEARLY WIPED OUT

BELLINGHAM, Wash., April 16.—Fire today destroyed more than half of the town of Hamilton, in the upper Skagit river valley, causing a loss estimated at \$100,000. The fire started shortly after midnight in a hardware store and spread to adjoining business buildings and residences.

Assistance from the Sedro Woolley fire department probably prevented destruction of the entire town.

Increase Pacific Phone Stock

SALEM, Ore., April 16.—The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company today filed supplementary articles of incorporation, showing an increase in capital stock from one hundred million to one hundred-thirty-five million dollars.

SARGENT LAUDED AS WORLD MASTER BY LONDON PRESS

LONDON, April 17.—If future generations endorse the encomiums published by today's English press, John Singer Sargent, the American artist who died at his Chelsea home yesterday will have a place in the temple of fame alongside the greatest masters of all time.

Art critics, editorial writers and society personages vie in paying homage to the genius and personality of the man.

"One of the immortals" is the designation one eulogist confers on him, while others rank him with Franz Hals or declare that no artist has earned such distinction since Van Dyke.

Satisfaction is expressed that his comparatively long life—was 69—enabled him to give so much and that he left the world rich in a series of works everyone of which is in its way a masterpiece.

He cared little for money, however, and he is said to have rejected frequent offers of enormous sums from moneyed persons who vainly yearned to be immortalized by his wonderful brush. One supposition given circulation is that his investments alone brought him an annual income of 9000 pounds.

EVIDENCE EXPLODES IN COURT ROOM

LONG BEACH, Cal., April 17.—Matches and gasoline were not expected to be called on for any further testimony in the trial here today of Bruce Arroll on a charge of burning his house. Hearing of the case was interrupted yesterday when an expert witness, desirous of illustrating his contention that a lighted match could be extinguished by dropping it in gasoline, lit a match and tossed it into a can full that had been brought into the court room. No one was injured in the resultant explosion and fire and the damage to the furniture was slight but the dignity of the court and spectators was badly searched.

VAN WINKLE 'SLAPS' GOVERNOR PIERCE

SALEM, Ore., April 17.—Attorney General Van Winkle declared today that he resents a statement by Governor Pierce implying that the attorney general had anything to do with the governor's allowing Harry and Alex Goldstein, convicted at the state penitentiary, a week's leave of absence to attend the passover ceremonies in Portland.

"The governor has never consulted me," said Van Winkle, "about granting leave of absence to prisoners, neither for the Goldsteins nor anyone else, and I resent his trying to saddle any part of the responsibility on me."

SHEPHERD PLEADS NOT GUILTY TO MURDER CHARGE

CHICAGO, April 16.—(By the Associated Press)—William D. Shepherd, charged with the murder of his foster son, William Nelson McClintock, pleaded not guilty today when formally arraigned in criminal court.

Chief Justice Jacob Hopkins overruled a defense motion to quash the indictment.

The state asked for an early trial, but the court said the date could be fixed by the trial judge when the case comes up in the regular course.

It was the first time Shepherd had been in court since his third unsuccessful effort to obtain freedom from jail on bail in the local courts.

A fourth effort in the Illinois supreme court by means of habeas corpus action also failed.

The defense motion to quash the indictment which charges that Shepherd and C. C. Falman murdered McClintock by the inoculation of typhoid germs was overruled without any argument. Falman never has been served with the indictment and has been held by the prosecution at a hotel. He is expected to be the principal witness against Shepherd and has testified that he taught Shepherd how to administer typhoid germs to produce death and that he was promised \$100,000 by Shepherd if his "million dollar deal" were successful.

WHIPPING POST LAW IS UP IN MICHIGAN

LANSING, Mich., April 17.—Two threats of re-establishment of a legal status of the whipping post in Michigan were made in the state senate today. George M. Condon, attorney, announced he was having a bill drawn allowing judges to sentence wife beaters to lashes with the knot.

Senator Arthur E. Woods said he was having a bill drawn which would prescribe ten lashes for each year sentenced for robbery while armed.

REPORT CAPTURE OF SHEIK SAID

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 17.—(By the Associated Press.)—It is reported here today that Shiek Said, the leader of the Kurdish rebels, has been captured by the Turks engaged in putting down the Kurdish revolt.

Turkey's forces at Diarbekir have executed 20 participants in the Kurdish rebellion and four others were executed at Hilla yesterday, according to reports reaching here today.

Sheik Said and most of his chief followers who were captured near Ghedj will be court-martialed at Diarbekir and probably hanged, according to a message from Angora.

FIND LINCOLN'S CAR ON RAILROAD SIDING

BALTIMORE, April 17.—The railroad coach in which Abraham Lincoln rode to Gettysburg to deliver his famous address on the battlefield in 1863 was found today on a siding in the yards of the Western Maryland railway. The historic but dilapidated car was discovered by a Pennsylvania committee of the Lincoln Highway association that visited Baltimore.

The committee will seek to have the coach taken to Gettysburg and kept as an historic memorial.

Mildred Harris Marries the Same Man Twice

NEW YORK, April 17.—Mildred Harris, who divorced Charles Chaplin in 1920, has just revealed that she has been married twice to E. Terrence McGovern, a realtor. The first marriage, she said, was in Mexico last November after a two years' engagement, and the second was in Greenwich, Conn., last week. The bride says she is doubly happy.

Seey Work to Visit Bend.

BEND, Ore., April 15.—Hubert Work, secretary of the interior, will visit the Deschutes irrigation projects in July, according to an announcement made today by James M. Kyle, president of the irrigation congress. Mr. Kyle was a speaker at the commercial club forum today outlining plans of the irrigation congress for securing federal aid for the Deschutes project.

Tell Parent by Finger Prints.

OSLO, Norway, April 16.—A Norwegian woman of science, Professor Doctor Christine Bonnevie, claims to have evolved a method to determine by means of finger prints the identity of the father of a child in cases of doubtful parentage. She asserts that certain characteristics invariably recur in the finger prints of individual families.

Creamery Men Meet Astoria.

ASTORIA, Ore., April 16.—The newly organized North Pacific Creamery association met here today for discussion of creamery problems. A butter scoring contest and cream grading were included in the program. Representatives of co-operative creameries of Oregon and Washington were present.

Louis Swift to Visit Crane

PORTLAND, Ore., April 15.—Louis F. Swift, president of Swift and company left here Tuesday night on his return trip to Chicago, intending to stop a few days at Crane, Ore., to inspect the company's cattle ranch interests.

Oregon Worker Killed.

CRANE, Ore., April 17.—Harold Elliott was instantly killed yesterday afternoon while working on the base of concrete abutment at the Standard Oil plant here. The abutment broke and a one-ton slab fell on Elliott crushing his head and chest.

CALIF. DECLARES AN EMBARGO ON OREGON POTATOES

OLYMPIA, Wash., April 17.—To prevent the possibility of the importation of the Colorado potato beetle pest in shipments of potatoes from Washington, Oregon and Idaho, the state of California has put into effect a virtual quarantine, Charles L. Robinson, state supervisor of horticulture has been advised.

During the active period of the pest from April 1 to September 30, all potatoes from the Pacific northwest states must bear certificates of inspection by the state departments of agriculture in order to be shipped into California.

The Colorado potato beetle is not found in districts of this state, where potatoes are grown in commercial quantities, Mr. Robinson said.

"The threatened quarantine has all the earmarks of an embargo for commercial reasons," Mr. Robinson declared.
