Eugene's city school superintendent will get \$5000 this coming year, according to the new salary schedule announced by the board. High school principals will get \$2400, \$2100 and \$1800 respectively, at Eugene, Woodrow Wilson and Theodore Roosevelt schools. Grade school principals will get \$1400 to \$1800, and department heads \$1650. High school teachers will be paid \$1200 to \$1400, while grade teachers will get \$1035 to \$1260.

The high school coach will get only \$1500. The same salary will be paid the girls' physical director. Manual training teachers and sewing teachers in the grades will get \$1600.
