M. BARRON ESTATE IS APPRAISED AT A \$26,443 VALUE

Appraisal of the estate of Martha
 A. Barron of Ashland, well known
 pioneer southern Oregon woman,
 filed Thursday with the county court
 shows it to be valued at \$26,443.50.
 The appraisers were V. O. N. Smith,
 O. Winter and Fred Engle, all of
 Ashland.

The personal property is appraised
 at \$24,733.50, and the realty prop-
 erty at \$1,670, the latter consisting
 of four lots in Ashland, valued at
 \$800, and 10 lots in Rose avenue
 addition, this city, valued at \$870.

The personal property consisted of
 \$2690 cash, notes of \$2173, \$1040,
 and \$2000 and \$625 due on a con-
 tract for the sale of a lot in Ash-
 land.

Other holdings consisted of five
 shares of the Citizens National bank
 of Ashland, appraised at \$675; 85
 shares of California Oregon Power
 company issues, appraised at \$15,-
 085, and 60 shares of Pacific Light
 and Electric company stock ap-
 praised at \$5940.

Five notes for \$100 each, secured
 over ten years ago, are appraised
 at no value, as are 100 shares of
 Trigon oil stock, and 10 shares of
 the Gordon Campbell Syndicate of
 Montana, also an oil project.

CATTLE AND SHEEP CONTROVERSY UP TO LOCAL COURT

A memorandum in the suit of the
 Big Butte Horse and Cattle associa-
 tion against Alex Anderson, involv-
 ing the right of the defendant to
 graze sheep on a cattle range, and
 which has been pending for many
 months, was filed in the circuit court
 Thursday.

Anderson is alleged to have grazed
 sheep on a legalized cattle range,
 but claims it is deeded land. He
 also doubts the right of the legisla-
 ture to pass a law, restricting graz-
 ing of stock.

The memorandum sets forth that
 the legislature has the right to regu-
 late the public domain, and that the
 supreme court of the land, and sev-
 eral states have held that the law
 is reasonable, and not restrictive of
 constitutional rights.

All claimants of the Big Butte
 district, are named plaintiffs in the
 action.

FREE KLAMATH INDIAN ON MURDER CHARGE

YREKA, Cal., April 17.—Chester
 Pepper, Klamath Indian, was ac-
 quitted yesterday by the jury
 which had heard his trial on a
 charge of murdering Willie Harry,
 another Indian, in a knife fight at
 Somes Bar, on the Klamath river
 January 18. Pepper pleaded self-
 defense. The trial was conducted
 almost entirely in the Klamath In-
 dian tongue, with interpreters.

FOUR DEATHS IN BEND FROM FLU EPIDEMIC

BEND, Ore., April 17.—Two deaths
 last night from influenza and pneu-
 monia bring the total number of
 deaths from flu and complications in
 Bend to four during the present epi-
 demic. Thomas Edward Moran of
 Spokane who has been employed at
 Odell Lake on the Natron cut-off con-
 struction was the fourth victim. The
 two men who died last night were
 each 21 years of age.

DRY RECEIPTS OF COUNTY FAR IN EXCESS, EXPENSES

Fines collected in Jackson county
 since January 1st, and paid into the
 county treasury for violations of the
 prohibition laws, amount of \$1644.99,
 25 per cent of this sum, or \$411.25,
 was turned over to the state, and
 the balance is in the local prohibi-
 tion fund, for enforcement work,
 under the direction of the district
 attorney's office. The dry expenses
 for the period are less than \$500.
 Under a law passed by the last
 legislature, 50 per cent of the funds
 collected for liquor violations are di-
 verted to the state, and this law
 became effective April 1.
