

WOMAN INJURED IN AUTO CRASH IN SISKIYOU

ASHLAND, April 17.—(Special).—Mrs. J. B. Zittmen, of Siskiyou Springs, Arkansas was badly hurt in a head-on collision which occurred near the summit of the Siskiyou late yesterday afternoon about one mile north of Jones' ranch. According to eye witnesses, the Zittmen car was coming north. A Fetherkile, of Coalinga, Cal., was driving south and came out from behind a truck just as the other car was passing, causing the wreck. Mrs. Zittmen was thrown thru the windshield and other members of the family were badly shaken. The car was thrown to one side of the road and badly smashed. The Fetherkile car was badly damaged but he was unhurt. Fetherkile is being detained in Ashland awaiting the outcome of Mrs. Zittmen's injuries.

HARVARD CREW IS PROMISING, GOOD PROGRESS MADE

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., April 17.—(By the Associated Press.)—For the first time in several years, Harvard's prospects for a winning varsity crew appears promising this spring.

Away to a good start with mild weather which has permitted rowing a month earlier than usual, the crew has attained advanced condition and form. There is as much power in the first varsity boat as last year at the same time, the stroke is longer, the rowing smoother and the men work better together.

Coaches praise the mental attitude of the crew.

So far only a slow stroke has been used, never surpassing 24 to the minute and remaining for the most part at 20. The order in practice has been: Stroke, Winthrop; 7, Leavitt; 6, Hubbard; 5, Johnson; 4, Darlington; 3, Platt; 2, Ladd; Bow, Captain Kelley and Coxswain Heard.

Winthrop, Johnson and Kelley rowed in last year's varsity. Darlington, Hubbard and Heard were with the 1924 second crew. The first of these two, with Leavitt, rowed with the champion class crew before they were promoted. Ladd, ineligible for the 1924 freshmen crew, was recognized as a strong oarsman. Platt captained last year's freshman shell. A second and third varsity are also on the water with experienced oarsmen.

Johnson at number five is rated by many observers as the best oarsman in the varsity shell. Captain Kelley is the only member of the crew who has been a regular for three years and is smooth, skilled and strong enough to stand the four mile grind with Yale. He has also proved a good leader.

CINCINNATI AND ATHLETICS LEAD

NEW YORK, April 17.—Two teams progressed to their third successive victories in the National and American leagues yesterday by opposite routes.

Pitching of unusually high caliber for the early season carried the Cincinnati Reds to undisputed possession of first place in the senior league. After

two previous displays of defensive strength posted by Donohue and Luque, the former league champions were pitched to a third victory over the Cardinals by Ephie Rixey, 7 to 3. All three moundmen limited the St. Louis to six hits.

In marked contrast to Cincinnati's method triumph, Connie Mack's Athletics again rescued weak hitting by sheer hitting strength in piling up their third win over the Red Sox, 7 to 3. The Phillies duplicated their opening day's total of thirteen safeties.

TREE PLANTATION IN CRATER FOREST IS IN GOOD SHAPE

Messrs. E. J. Handrik of Portland and L. P. Brown of Medford returned from an inspection trip of the Snowshoe and Pountat areas in the Crater national forest this week.

Mr. Brown reports good growth of the Snowshoe plantation which was planted with yellow pine in 1912. The trees are now growing at a rate of a foot a year in height. They were originally planted in the shade of wild lilac and serviceberry brush, which acted as a cover in protecting the seedling trees from too much sun and from drying winds. The trees are now overtopping and killing the brush, so that within a few years the plantation will assume the appearance of a forest of thrifty young trees.

Very little damage was done to the plantation during the winter. Only an occasional tree was killed by snow-break, porcupines or other causes. There are from four hundred



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to five hundred trees per acre. The loss for the first twelve years, which includes the period of greatest mortality, has been out twenty-five per cent. Very little further loss is anticipated.
