

STATE HOSPITAL  
ATTACHE HELPS  
INMATE ESCAPE

SALEM, Ore., April 17.—E. J. Tobin, who for the last two months has been an attendant at the state hospital for the insane, was arrested today in the office of Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner, superintendent of the institution and is in the county jail charged with aiding and abetting an inmate to escape.

The charge recites that last Tuesday night Tobin let Orel Courter, an inmate, out of a ward at the hospital, and later in the night met him with an automobile on 24th street. They drove to Falls City, in Polk county, it is alleged, to the home of Courter's father. From his father, Alex Courter, an old man who is blind, Orel Courter was to get \$100 and another automobile according to the inmate's story. Tobin was to meet at Vancouver and drive east to Chicago. The \$100 was to be given to Tobin. The elder Courter refused to let his son have the automobile.

Hospital authorities suspected that Courter had gone to Falls City and T. W. Campbell, a supervisor at the hospital, was sent there to look for him. He found the Courter house barred, but succeeded in returning the patient Wednesday.

When questioned today Tobin is said to have confessed to taking a ring from another patient recently. The charge under which he was arrested is under a new statute which provides a penalty of \$1000 fine and six months in jail. Tobin and Courter are about 24 years old. Tobin left his employment at the hospital last Tuesday without notifying any of the authorities, but returned today to get his pay. While he has not admitted the story as told by Courter he has given other information that tends to confirm the story. Courter was committed from Polk county for attacking girls and is said to be dangerous when at large.

RUSH STAMPS TO  
COAST BY AIRPLANE

WASHINGTON, April 17.—A special air mail service plane, carrying 2,500,000 of the new half-cent Nathan Hale stamps to supply postmasters at Denver, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Portland will leave Bolling field here tomorrow morning. The western postmasters did not receive an adequate supply of the stamps before the new third class postage rates went into effect Wednesday and the post office department immediately impressed the air mail plane into service to rush the supply. Another plane will leave Monday morning for western cities carrying another large consignment of the stamps.

GRAND DRAGON'S  
HOME IS BURNED  
BY INCENDIARIES

INDIANAPOLIS, April 18.—The large home of D. C. Stephenson, hatched grand dragon of the Ku Klux Klan of Indiana, indicted in connection with alleged attacks on Miss Madge Oberholzer, who died Tuesday from effects of poison self administered following the alleged attacks, was partially destroyed by fire early today, believed to have been of incendiary origin.

Two cans of kerosene and one of gasoline were found in the wrecked house by firemen.

The entire interior and roof of the house was destroyed. Firemen who had the flames under control declared that all gas jets in the house were turned on. An explosion which broke all the windows was heard just before the flames were seen by neighbors.

A sort time before the explosion automobiles were seen in the yard by neighbors, who attached no significance to this incident until after the explosion.

Police and fire officials are making an investigation.

Stephenson has been living at a downtown hotel for several weeks, and no one was believed to be living in the house.

Miss Madge Oberholzer, whom Stephenson is charged with assault with intent to kill, assault with attempt to rape, malicious mayhem and with conspiracy to kidnap, was buried yesterday.

RUNAWAY BLIMP  
RETURNS TO PORT  
WITHOUT A SCRATCH

PULHAM, England, April 17.—(By Associated Press.) To the cheers of British army officers, soldier workers and crowds of spectators, the army dirigible R-33 returned home safely shortly after two o'clock this afternoon after her 28-hour battle with the air current over the east coast of England and the storm swept North sea. The runaway craft, which tore away from her moorings at the Pulham air station yesterday during one of the fiercest gales in recent years, was sighted by the anxious watchers at the airbase at 1:54 o'clock this afternoon. She maneuvered for position and landed safely a quarter of an hour later.

A favorable wind allowed the sorely distressed crew of the R-33 to start their ship homeward from a point near the Dutch coast after daylight and she made a slow steady flight across the North sea which yesterday she had passed over in the opposite direction, driven onward by the wind. Hearty cheers went up to them as the ship passed low over the shore line.

An excited crowd had waited on the shore since the big craft with her damaged prow dropping low was swept out to sea yesterday.

The British air ministry officials are loud in their praise of the stability of the R-33 which withstood the severe buffeting to which it had been subjected and it is their opinion that the crew gained much valuable experience during their forced journey.

With many instruments distributed throughout the ship for the purpose of gaining data for airship construction, valuable information is expected to be obtained as a result of the runaway flight.

As the truant ship approached home Vice Air Marshal Sir W. Geoffrey Salmon wireless to the crew: "Your efforts splendid. They rebound to the credit of all."

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., April 17.—Klamath Falls is to be the home of a new western monthly magazine, according to announcement here today by L. E. Banker, chairman of the board of trustees of the Western Publishing company. The first issue will be published early this fall.

Arrangements have been completed for the construction of a building to house the mechanical and editorial departments of the publication, which will be called "The Westerner."

A syndicate composed of publishers and others from Oregon, California and Washington are interested in the project, according to Mr. Banker. Incorporation papers have been completed and will be filed with the corporation commissioner at Salem within two weeks.
