REV. R. W. NELSON TO REMAIN AT PHOENIX CHURCH

After busy all-day and evening sessions at Klamath Falls, the regular spring meeting of the Presbytery of southern Oregon closed on Wednesday evening, with an address by Rev. F. Gordon Hart of Grants Pass on "The New Comprehensive Plan for Christian Education and Young People's Work." At noon Mr. Hart spoke before the Klamath Falls chamber of commerce at a special luncheon given by the chamber to the Presbytery and visiting friends.

Rev. R. W. Nelson, who has been the minister of the Phoenix church since October, was at his request, examined by the Presbytery, with a view to transferring his membership from the north Montana conference of the Methodist church to the Presbytery of southern Oregon. His examination was highly creditable, and action was taken by the Presbytery for the continuance of his work at Phoenix and looking to his transfer of membership when it can be fully arranged. The fine work he is doing at Phoenix is highly regarded by the Presbytery.

John S. Bonar, for many years the senior elder and clerk of the session of the Phoenix church, was elected as the lay delegate to the general assembly, the national gathering of the Presbyterian church, which meets this year in Columbus, Ohio. Rev. E. H. Edgar, pastor at Jacksonville, is the ministerial delegate, by seniority of service in the Presbytery; the alternate this year being Elder James Martin of Rogue River and Rev. Joseph W. Angell of Glendale.

The call of the Glendale church to Mr. Angell to become its regular pastor was presented at this meeting of Presbytery and approved.

A memorial service was held for Rev. John E. Day, whose death recently at Butte Falls was mentioned in these columns.

On Wednesday afternoon the business men of Klamath Falls gave the members and visitors at Presbytery an auto trip to upper Klamath lake and through the manufacturing district of the city, which is rapidly growing and makes an impressive showing. It was also reported that Armour & Co., meat packers, are planning to build a plant at Klamath Falls, which will employ several hundred men and do away with expensive cattle from southern Oregon to outside markets.

Record Crowds Fill Craterian. Douglas Fairbanks in "The Thief of Bagdad," which for pageantry and splendor has not been surpassed on the screen, is doing an extraordinary business at the Hunt's Craterian.

Some of the furnishings were brought from the Orient; many were copied from museums and from paintings. A tank fifty-two feet deep was built for the undersea scenes. Several thousand extras were used in the final scenes, those in which the Thief raises a great army out of nothing.
