

MEDFORD TO BE HEADQUARTERS OF S. O. BOY SCOUTS

The executive board of the Crater Lake council of Boy Scouts met Thursday afternoon with the new executive, Cecil A. Cook, and cleared the decks for constructive action in the Scout movement for southern Oregon. Representatives from Klamath Falls and Medford were present. Josephine county is also a part of the council area and Grants Pass expects to become a part of the new council in the near future.

The headquarters office of the council comprising three counties will be established in Medford. The old headquarters office at the South Methodist church will be used until suitable quarters are found.

Mr. Cook who comes to take the active charge of scouting in the council has been connected with the organization at Seattle for the past six years. He is said to be eminently qualified for the position of executive and comes highly recommended by the regional executive. He has established his family on South Orange street.

Rev. J. B. Coan, who launched the movement in Medford and served as commissioner and voluntary executive giving what time he could to the organization, will continue as commissioner for this district. Mr. Coan and other members of the scout council and all the scoutmasters are highly elated over the arrival of the executive to take the active leadership of the program and are predicting for this council one of the best in the state.

The following officers will direct the movement this year: Council—President, F. J. Newman; commissioner, Rev. A. L. Rice; Klamath secretary, Col. W. H. Paine; Medford treasurer, J. P. Kimball; Klamath Medford district officers: President, F. J. Newman; commissioner, J. B. Coan; secretary-treasurer, A. C. Bevan; Klamath district officers: President, R. E. Crego; commissioner, Julius Mueller; secretary-treasurer, J. A. Gordon.

The following were nominated to head the four departments: Training activities, Dr. R. R. Johnson; Medford business administration, F. A. Gordon; Klamath training, O. L. Cornwall; Medford field activities, W. E. Bobbit; Klamath. The entire council membership, composed of representative men of the communities, will be divided between these four departments through which the entire program of the organization is promoted.

A program of action for the executive and the organization was outlined by Executive Cook and Mr. Coan which will place the organization of troops, districts and the council in proper shape for a splendid type of work in the three counties.

The officials were authorized to take all necessary steps for the chartering of the council and meeting other requirements of the national council.

JURY UNABLE TO REACH A VERDICT IN BETTS TRIAL

The jury in the case against Merrill Betts of Gold Hill was unable to return a verdict at the trial in Judge Taylor's court here Thursday afternoon on the charge of being intoxicated last November, when Betts' car ran into the truck in which a Jacksonville man was moving his goods and badly injured him. The jury stood three and three.

At the trial Officers Leggett and Cave of the Medford police force, Dr. R. W. Clancy and a nurse at the Sacred Heart hospital testified that Betts was drunk when he took the injured man to the hospital; and Betts himself, while denying he was intoxicated then or at the time of the accident testified that he had taken two drinks of Jamaica ginger a short time before the accident. The only other witness for the defense was Bert Ross of Gold Hill who happened to pass along at the time of the accident, and who said that Betts was not intoxicated.

The members of the jury before whom the case was tried consisted of the following Medford men: P. C. Elgham, Carl Bowman, Clarence Bates, John Billings, T. G. Burrows and J. M. Lofland. The case will be tried again, but the date for the second trial has not yet been set, and in the meantime the \$200 bail bond on which Betts has been held since last November is still in force.

The long delay in trying the case, since the time of the accident, was due to the illness of Betts.

Wall Street Report

NEW YORK, April 18.—Stock prices continued their movement to higher ground today under the leadership of the motor shares. Maxwell and B. Mack Trucks and Nash Motors were marked up one to four points to record tops. Willys Overland preferred, dropped 2 1/2 points. American Chicle common and the certificates, Pullman, Seavey Arms, Bush Terminal and Matheson Alkali sold three to five points above yesterday's final figures, while Baldwin, American Car and Foundry, American Can, General Electric and United States Cast Iron Pipe recorded extreme gains of two points or more. Closing was strong. Total sales 800,000 shares.

MAUSOLEUM WILL BE ERECTED HERE DECLARES MASON

Medford is to be in line with a large number of other modern cities of the United States, by having erected in the Odd Fellows cemetery a hall of memory or community mausoleum, of modern construction and Grecian architecture.

G. D. Mason, who will have the construction in charge, and is securing the names of those who desire space, has erected a number of these mausoleums in Oregon, California and Arizona, the last one being at Ashland, which was dedicated a few weeks ago. Fifty families in Medford have signified their intentions and have already secured space.

The structure here will depend on the number of reservations, but will so doubt accommodate about two hundred and will cost approximately \$100,000.

Regarding the memorial and reasons for erection, Mr. Mason says: "To those who are unacquainted with this method of interment, we might state that the building will be a massive, indestructible tomb built of reinforced concrete, bronze, marble and art glass, imposing and beautiful in point of architecture, and containing crypts or individual compartments in which the caskets are placed, giving 'above ground' burial in permanently endowed homes that are constructed with the latest demands for sanitation and safety for both the living and the dead.

"For sentimental and other reasons, during the present era of scientific education and knowledge, more so than during any period since the dawn of history, has the realization of the advantages and indeed the necessity of burial above ground in scientifically constructed tombs or mausoleums become apparent because it is an essential element in the advancement of civilization.

"The community mausoleum is the crystallization of modern thought upon the subject of interment and embodies among others, the following arguments in its favor: It is a magnificent monument, a memorial building, embracing the enduring, the artistic and the beautiful, dedicated in tender sentiment to the memory of the loved ones who have passed on, made individual through the instrumentality of the grave marble with which each crypt is hermetically sealed after the casket is placed therein.

"Earth burial is essentially abhorrent and the sight of desolate unkempt cemeteries is so common that neither

word nor picture is required to emphasize the imperfections of burial in the ground. How gentler the thought of consigning the form of the dear one to its housing in the home of reverence and honor where free from elemental havoc the long sleep of perfect rest begins.

"In harmony with the perpetual scope of the community mausoleum idea, an adequate fund will be vested in the mausoleum association, the income of which alone may be used and which will be sufficient to provide for permanent maintenance and preservation of the mausoleum and its sacred contents forever."

CINCINNATI TIED BY CHICAGO CUBS, CLEVELAND LEADS

NEW YORK, April 18.—Western teams held undisputed possession of first place in the two major league races today with the champion Giants and Senators gaining ground after their slow starts.

The Cincinnati Reds, who galloped off to an unexpected three game winning streak with the opening, ran wild back into a tie for the lead with the Chicago Cubs yesterday. Their string was broken in an eleven inning game with the Cardinals.

The Cubs outbatted the Pirates to win at 9 to 6, Hartnett and Miller leading the attack. The former posted his fourth home run of the campaign and Miller led the players of both leagues for the day with four singles in as many turns at bat.

A sensational pitching duel, during which the Cleveland Indians produced another winner in Shaute, pushed the Speaker entry past the faltering Athletics into the American league pace making berth. Cleveland won one to nothing.

Boston's defeat of the Philadelphia Americans, 4 to 3, dropped Mack's contingent into a tie for second place with the Senators who again pushed back the Yankees, 6 to 1.

was represented at the last world's fair here, the Columbian exposition in 1893. The occupations exhibited this year include plumbing, circus riding and prospecting.

Cabbages played a large part in making such diversifications, according to Miss Esteline Bennett of the fair management.

"For it was cabbages thrown at Susan B. Anthony in the east years ago," said Miss Bennett, that prompted a plainsman to introduce in the legislature of Wyoming Territory, the first woman's suffrage bill in history.

"He offered it as a rebuke to the cabbage-throwing, and as an expression of the chivalry of the frontier. He argued that the men of Wyoming would not set silent and inert when a woman was mistreated. The bill was adopted.

"Later, when Wyoming asked for statehood, the question arose as to whether she would be permitted to retain her suffrage provision. The men of Wyoming replied that they would wait forty years more for statehood rather than enter the sisterhood of states without their women. When Wyoming attained statehood, it was as the first suffrage state in the union.

"Wyoming sends to the Woman's World Fair the first woman governor inaugurated in the United States, Mrs. Nellie Talbot Ross."

The woman prospector exhibiting at the fair is Miss Helen Parchal of Regina, Sask. She is a specialist in the location of pottery clays and is said to be the only woman eremic engineer in the world.

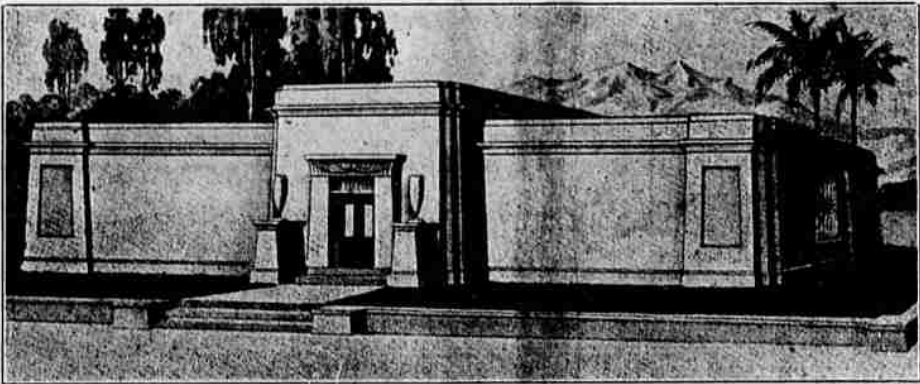
