

FUNERAL OF COL. FRANK RAY IS HELD IN EAST

HUNTINGTON, L. 1.—Col. Frank H. Ray, owner of one of the large estates on East Neck, in the Halesite section, died Saturday after an illness of about two weeks.

He was a prominent man in the tobacco business and was interested in mining. Many young men have him to thank for their start in business. One incident was the start in the bicycle business of a young man who later played the "Haystack" on the market, naming it after his benefactor.

Col. Ray received his title in the state militia, of Illinois, in which he served for years.

He was 69 years of age, having been born near Chicago in July, 1856. In his early life he saw possibilities in the tobacco business and first affiliated with the E. J. Sorg Tobacco company, of which he was later vice-president. He was later interested in the Continental Tobacco company and was finally one of the organizers and vice-president of the American Tobacco company.

He had many other interests. He was organizer of the Great Western Power company of California which supplied power to a great part of the Pacific coast, and for years was its president. He also formed another large power plant in Oregon. His interest also turned toward mining properties and he was one of the directors of the Dolores Esplanade Gold and Silver Mining Corporation.

In club life he was a member of the Bankers, Metropolitan, Auto and American and Huntington Bay clubs and the Huntington association.

He had a large estate, Glen Crest, near London, at which place he passed several months each year until his health failed. He had traveled extensively in Europe and his large home here is filled with curios that he had gathered on these travels.

The funeral services were held this morning at 10 o'clock at St. Patrick's Catholic church, the Rev. Thomas Murray officiating. Interment was in the West Neck cemetery. A widow and two daughters survive.—Brooklyn Eagle, April 13.

SNOW FALLS IN FOOTHILLS, 17 FT., CRATER LAKE RIM

A telephone report received this forenoon at his headquarters here by Superintendent C. G. Thomson from Ranger Oard at Crater National park, stated that there was over 17 feet of snow at the rim of Crater lake and 11 feet and 8 inches at Anna Spring camp, and it was still snowing hard at the time of phoning.

There are about three or more inches of snow at the summit of the Siskiyou, at which place Medford people, who passed over the mountain Sunday afternoon said that at that time there was three inches. Travelers arriving in the city this forenoon said that it was snowing this morning in the Weed vicinity, and Medfordites arriving in the city from the north last night said it snowed yesterday all the way from Eugene to Grants Pass.

There is a heavy sprinkle of snow from Riddle to Glendale and snow is frozen to the trees and shrubbery through the Cow Creek canyon. 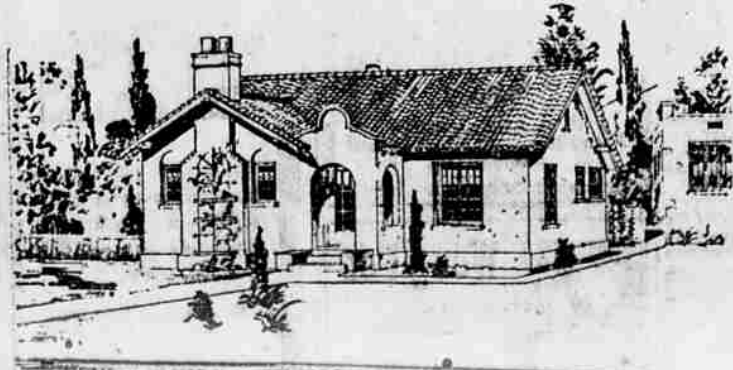

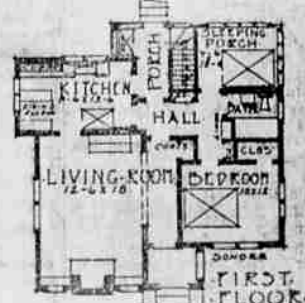
