

ASK COUNTY TO IMPROVE ROAD TO LAKE OF WOODS

ASHLAND, April 20.—A petition was circulated last week by Professor Irving E. Vining, among the business men, for the repairing of the Dead Indian road to the Lake of the Woods. The petition is addressed to the county commissioners and requests them to have this road work done before the vacationists start going to the Lake of the Woods, the Mecca of the

Valley as a summer resort. Cottages have increased greatly the past years, many of them built by Ashland people. A long list of names are attached to the petition, every one glad to do so for the road is in constant use during the summer season. A part of the road was improved last summer, but there is still a considerable distance that needs to be improved.
