

LISBON REVOLT PUT DOWN WITH AN IRON HAND

LONDON, April 21.—(By Associated Press.) Latest advices received from official quarters from Lisbon today indicate all is quiet in the Portuguese capital and that order has been restored after Saturday's short-lived revolt.

The attempted coup was started Saturday and there was violent fighting throughout the night, the movement only being quelled yesterday when the rebellious troops gave up their arms and were confined in barracks.

The revolt was led by Major Filomeno Camara, who had under him several hundred men, cavalry, artillery and infantry.

Many of the revolutionists were killed or wounded when regular troops drew a cordon about their headquarters and showered them with shrapnel. Lisbon dispatches have given no estimate of the number of casualties but they are said to have been comparatively high for such a brief period of activity.

With befeigned hands I went to the door. 'Good morning, madam,' a pleasant young man greeted me. 'I have here' a wonderful little invention, a labor-saving, time-saving and money-saving device. Something every woman should have in her home. Now, madam, if I may just step inside and—

"I am not large, but only over my dead body could he have entered my door just then. While he paused for breath, I assured him that I was not interested and hastily closed the door before he could resume his oration.

"Back to the pie I hastened, accompanied by that uncomfortable feeling that always remains after committing a discourteous act. Perhaps thirty peaceful minutes elapsed, then the door bell rang again. This time a woman presented me with a nice little sample of a new washing powder and spent ten minutes in a rapid-fire discourse on the merits of her product. When she finally departed, I wondered why I had never before appreciated those unkind jokes concerning the 'tongues of women.'

"Later on I had only to convince a nice old gentleman that neither I nor any of my immediate relatives cared to purchase a coupon entitling us to a dozen photographs with one ten-by-twelve enlargement absolutely free.

"Finally, arriving at the luncheon a trifle late, I excused myself by saying that if three agents hadn't interrupted my morning, I would have arrived on time. Conversation had been lagging until that remark, then, true woman fashion, everyone began to talk at once and they were all recounting experiences with agents and peddlers. Bemoaning the daily interruptions and loss of time.

"But you don't have to answer the bell," someone will say. Of course not! Acting upon the advice of a friend who never answered her door without first peeping out, I tried that one. It worked beautifully until my husband sent a man out from the office unannounced, to get some valuable papers that he wanted in a hurry. Well, he looked like an ordinary agent to me. So I refused to answer his persistent ringing of my door bell.

"There is seemingly no end to the variety of commodities that the salesmen offer at my front door. Everything from an electric washer to a box of flea powder has been offered me in the course of a few months. Of late the silk hosiery agents have been more numerous than any others. A favorite 'trick' of the peddlers is to tell you that Mrs. So-and-So is an old customer of his and that he just sold her certain products.

"You have no redress in case you are displeased. It certainly isn't as convenient as returning things to the store, especially if you have a 'charge it' as the little girl said.

"Some day I hope to pock up a newspaper and read the news that women in the legislature has introduced a bill prohibiting all house-to-house canvassing for the purpose of selling any commodity whatsoever. I'd like to see some candidate for public office make that one plank of his platform.

"Strange it might seem to attempt to force these house-to-house salesmen to respect the privacy of the home and to establish themselves in stores where people could seek redress if they so desired. But wouldn't it be a progressive step toward the further emancipation of the housewife? At least it is pleasant to dream of that gala day when I can sally forth and nail upon my own front door that coveted blue and white sign, 'No Peddlers or Agents Allowed,' no longer doubting its effectiveness, but knowing that behind it stands the great, grim law which even the most audacious salesman dare not defy."

GERMANY TAKING LITTLE INTEREST IN PRESIDENCY

BERLIN, April 21.—(By Associated Press.) With the decisive balloting in Germany's first presidential election only a week off, popular interest in the fight between former Chancellor Marx and Field Marshal Von Hindenburg continued dormant or of a wholly negative character.

Von Hindenburg's campaign got under way at Hanover yesterday when the candidate of the nationalist bloc gave the first formal public utterance of his political program. He is being presented to the German voters not only as a national hero but as a man who is above parties and partisan politics, and who is ordained to bring to the fatherland a much needed national unity.

Republican campaigners are making their fight on Von Hindenburg not only because of his political endorsement, but also on the score of his personal qualifications and advanced years.

"If you love Von Hindenburg, vote for Marx," is one of their campaign slogans.

Dr. Marx is making international reconciliation, continuation of Germany's foreign policies and a defense of her economic main points of his appeal to the voters.

The united right thus far has conducted its campaign on paper only, avoiding discussion of international or economic issues and is apparently staking all on Von Hindenburg's personality and his ability to capture votes from the former stay-at-home to insure victory.

PACIFIC FLEET IS NEARING ISLAND, KEY TO HAWAII

SAN FRANCISCO, April 21.—(By the Associated Press.)—Six days out-bound on its mission of recapturing the island of Oahu from the "black" or "enemy" force which holds Hawaii, the United States fleet in its epochal exercises is utilizing almost every unit of its force before contact is made in the effort of action. Hardly a moment passes in the 24 hours that does not find some department of offense or defense in the armada of 127 ships evorting thru some maneuver of naval action or utilization of the paraphernalia of fighting apparatus aboard.

Communications, first essential to full tactical control of all units which is necessary to insure proper team play and co-ordination of efforts to utilize the striking power to the utmost is one of the prime elements of activity aboard.

Radio silence, enforced to keep from the enemy the knowledge of the concentration's position speed and course, and "darken ship" which forbids the use of searchlight or blinker at night, prevent the testing of communication facilities except during the night.

The heart of the day signaling is the U. S. S. California, flagship of Admiral S. S. Robison, commander in chief of the fleet, whose task is to capture Oahu. The signal bridge of the great dreadnaught and its fountain head, the fleet communication office, are reminiscent of a broker's office in Wall street on a "million share day," with the bustle of activity in preparation and dissemination of commands to the commanders of the 127 vessels.

VON HINDENBURG REFUSES TO REPLY TO KAISER QUERY

LONDON, April 21.—Field Marshal Von Hindenburg who hitherto has refused interviews says Reuters's correspondent at Hanover consented to reply to a questionnaire submitted by the correspondent.

"The field marshal declined to answer a question as to whether he would prefer to see the former Kaiser on the throne to being himself president," says the correspondent.

Asked whether he was prepared to sign a security pact guaranteeing the frontiers of France and Belgium, he replied that this matter was still the subject of international discussion and therefore he could not personally intervene.

Asked whether he was of the opinion that the present eastern frontier of Germany must be altered in Germany's favor, Von Hindenburg is quoted as replying:

"I share this opinion with all other Germans, but in order not to endanger peace the question must be settled by negotiations."

Asked: "Will you, when president, do all in your power to see that the military clauses of the Versailles treaty are fulfilled?" he answered: "The treaty is binding for us until it is altered by a new agreement between the parties to the treaty. The military prescriptions of the treaty are naturally part of the fulfillment of the treaty."

SOVIET RUSSIA CURTLY REFUSES ARMS PROPOSAL

GENEVA, April 21.—(By the Associated Press.)—Soviet Russia has refused to participate in the forthcoming conference on the control of traffic in arms.

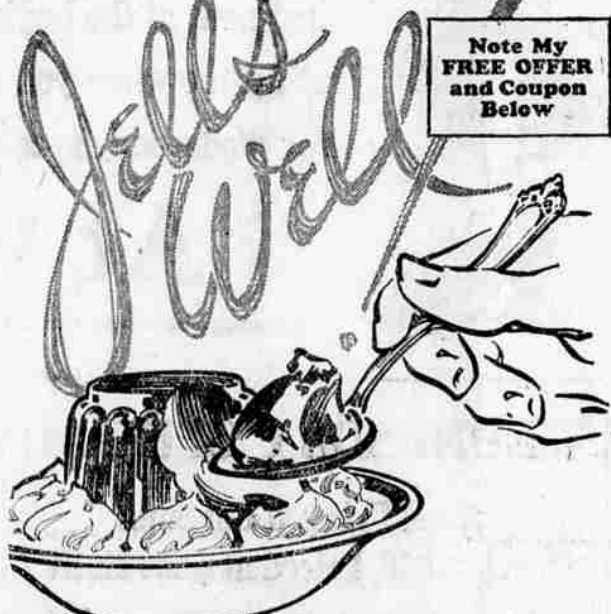
"The refusal was contained in a stiffly worded telegram from Foreign Minister Tchitcherin, pointing out that the Soviet government had repeatedly proclaimed its negative attitude toward the League of Nations as presently organized.

Referring to the invitation to attend the arms traffic conference, the Soviet foreign minister said:

"In the present case, the Soviet government finds it impossible to collaborate with the League in study of a question which implies interference by the League of Nations in the internal affairs of the Soviet republic."

Germany was capable of a defensive war, Von Hindenburg replied:

"My opinion as a military expert is that Germany is not even capable of defending herself against a small neighboring state, for states like Poland and Czechoslovakia possess much bigger standing armies than we do and are protected by military alliances, so that, in any event, we should be confronted by a power whose armament was much superior to ours."
