

STREET CARNIVAL LICENSES RAISED BY CITY FATHERS

The city council at its meeting last night, which was attended by all members but Paul McDonald and Mayor Alenderfer, took action intended to bar carnivals from the city by increasing the license fee from \$50 a day to \$100 a day; passed an ordinance to the effect that the local merchants' association licensing peddlers and hawkers, passed another ordinance licensing solicitors, which it is thought will do away here with fake solicitors of all kinds, and also took action to do away with wooden sidewalks out of repair and to hasten the building of the many concrete sidewalks, which were ordered some time ago.

The increase of license for carnivals comes too late to bar out two, which have already been booked and the managements of which had already obtained permits and paid the fees in advance; first, the Snap Bros. shows the week of May 18, and second the Foley & Burke shows some time in May or June. The sentiment of the councilmen was unanimous for making the license as high as to bar out carnivals. The circus license ordinance remains the same—from \$25 to \$100 a day, according to the size of the show.

The new ordinance licensing peddlers and hawkers provides for graded license fees, according to the classes of business, from \$7.50 to \$300 semi-annually, the lowest for peddling of food stuffs, and the highest for peddling by auto or team load.

There is a provision in this ordinance, however, so that it does not affect the selling of farm produce and the like raised in Jackson, Josephine and Klamath counties.

The new ordinance licensing solicitors requires that the concern a solicitor is taking orders for, put up a bond of \$500, guaranteeing that orders so taken will be filled as represented, or the money refunded to persons who gave the solicitor orders.

The sidewalk situation was fully discussed and the council decided that all dangerous wooden sidewalks must be torn out by the owners, else the city will do the work and charge the same up against the property. As to the many concrete sidewalks already ordered in, which orders have been ignored, the council will rush strenuous measures to bring such improvements about, and instructed its committee on streets and Superintendent Davis to make a canvass of the sidewalk situation with power to act.

Much routine business was also discussed last night.

GREAT NORTHERN PRESIDENT VISITS CAPITAL OF STATE

SALEM, Ore., April 22.—Interest in the development of the flax growing and spinning industry in the Willamette valley was manifested by Ralph Budd, president of the Great Northern Railroad company, during the few minutes that he was in Salem yesterday afternoon. Mr. Budd was here only the few minutes that the Oregon Electric train stopped at the depot.

Mr. Budd said he was not familiar with the efforts now being made here to establish the flax industry but the questions he asked about it indicated that he knew considerable about flax in general. He wanted to know about the acreage and whether the flax grown here was of the long fibre variety.

Mr. Budd arrived on the four o'clock train from the south. Word had been received earlier in the day that he and his party would come from Corvallis by automobile, but their plans were changed because of a desire to look over Oregon Electric properties enroute.

Mr. Budd will return here Thursday of this week and expects to spend several hours in the city. He expects to arrive about noon.

The railway president expressed himself optimistically about business.

NEW HIGH SCHOOL MEETING TONIGHT

700 NEW FAMILIES LOCATED IN OREGON BY PORTLAND C. OF C.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 22.—(Special)—More than 700 new families representing an investment in excess of \$2,000,000, have been located in Oregon during the past year through the efforts of the Land Settlement department of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, according to a report completed by W. G. Ide, manager of the department, for presentation at the annual meeting of the Portland chamber, April 24th.

During the same period, the number of agricultural inquiries received totaled more than 15,000, of whom 1057 prospective settlers have definitely announced their intention of coming to Oregon this year. The report stresses particularly the active co-operation received by the land settlement department from a majority of the counties of the state, and calls attention to the enormous volume of inquiries received in recent months. During March, for example, more than 4700 requests for agricultural information were received, and these inquiries have been relayed to all Chambers of Commerce in the state. Notables to attend the meeting include Ralph Budd, president of the Great Northern Railway company; Carl Gray, president Union Pacific; Charles Donnelly, president Northern Pacific, and John Perrin, chairman of the board of the federal bank of San Francisco.

6 FIREMEN INJURED SAN FRANCISCO FIRE

SAN FRANCISCO, April 22.—Battalion Chief John F. Kearney was severely injured and six other firemen slightly hurt in an early morning fire here today. Two lodging houses and an automobile supply store were burned with a loss of \$20,000 to \$40,000.

Policeman Ray O'Connell carried several women and children to safety. Others jumped into a life net from the second and third floors of the lodging houses.
