LOCAL MEETING UNANIMOUS FOR NEW HI. SCHOOL

If the unanimous sentiment expressed by the large body of representative citizens attending the public meeting last night at the library for discussion of the new high school situation, is any criterion the special election of May 5 next to vote \$185,000 worth of bonds for the purchase of a site and construction of the first unit of a new high school, will go over with a bang.

Included among those present were a number of citizens who voted against the proposed new high school at previous elections. They are now heartily in favor of voting the bond issue.

The question of site was not discussed at the meeting, as that question will come up at another special election a week after the bond election. The sentiment of each of the speakers and the many others present was that the only question now at issue is the voting of the bonds, and to take up the site matter after the bond issue is passed.

What helped along this situation was the promise made at the meeting by the majority of school board members present, to abide by the decision of the majority of the voters at the special site election, and to

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put that promise in writing, should there be any doubt held by any voters about it.

During the discussion quite a number of compliments were expressed for the hard work the school board has done towards a new high school, and the city planning commission for having had such a comprehensive survey, with the cooperation of the school board, made by the University of Oregon experts.

Hence, before adjourning, the assembly unanimously voted an expression of confidence in the school board and of gratitude to the city planning commission for having brought the survey to the surface.

The view was expressed by many citizens that the publication in full of this survey in yesterday's Mail Tribune, which was eagerly read by the people of the city generally, not only clarified the high school situation and put an end to baseless rumors in connection therewith, but brought the public as never before to realize that Medford must have a new high school and that as soon as possible.

Hence all the speeches at the meeting were short, but all were of the same tenor: Vote the bonds, and personally labor with all your friends and acquaintances to do so.

All the various city bodies were well represented at the meeting, including the school board, the city council, the city water commission and the city planning commission. Among those who spoke were Mayor O. O. Anderson, ex-Mayor Earl C. Gaddis, H. E. Harder, E. C. Stillman, O. C. Boggs, Delroy Getchell, H. C. Lundgren, H. L. Walther, Glen Armstrong and A. L. Hill of the city water commission, E. E. Kelly, George Hewitt, City Attorney John H. Carlin, Bert Anderson, City Attorney John H. Carlin, Messrs. Milla, Franklin and Wilson of the school board, Councilmen Jacobs and Janney, C. M. English, Superintendent Aubrey G. Smith, Messrs. Hanby and Anderson, Rev. J. B. Coan and O. C. Boggs of the city planning commission, and Postmaster W. J. Wagner.

O. C. Boggs, president of the city planning commission, presided at the meeting, explained how the commission brought about the survey by the U. of O. experts.

One important phase relating to the coming special election, which met with general approval, was brought out by E. C. Stillman when he stated that the school board should provide active clerks and judges and other facilities for fast voting, especially at the bond election, so that voters will not be unnecessarily delayed in casting their ballots and have to stand in line a long time waiting to vote, as has been the case in number of previous school elections; else a number of votes would be lost by citizens becoming disgusted at the tedious wait and departing without voting.

Former Mayor Gaddis, and H. L. Walther of the city water commission, in their brief remarks advocating the voting of bonds for a new high school, explained that they opposed the voting of bonds two years ago because at that time there was no comprehensive plan submitted for such a high school. Now that the school board had a definite known public plan, aided by a survey by experts,

HEAVYWEIGHT MAT TITLE MESSED UP BETWEEN TRUSTS

CHICAGO, April 23.—Prolongation of the dispute as to who is the world's heavyweight wrestling champion, was seen today in plans to match Ed "Strangler" Lewis and Wayne "Big" Munn for a go in the open air arena, at Michigan City, Ind., May 30, with the diamond studded belt, emblematic of the title and still held by Lewis, at stake.

Although the veteran, Stanislaus Zbyszko, carries the title as the result of his defeat of Munn at Philadelphia, Lewis, previously had refused to turn the belt over to Munn when the giant Nebraska took his measure at Kansas City in January, on the ground that Munn should have been disqualified for foul tactics in tossing him from the ring.

Billy Sandow, representing Lewis, is authority for the statement that the diamond championship belt will be at stake.

The veteran Pole, in meeting his opponents in eastern cities, is believed in some quarters to have altered himself with what is known as the eastern "wrestling trust," with Lewis and Munn holding allegiance to the western trust. If such is the case, the easterners have the title and the westerners the belt, with the outcome of the dispute a matter for the future to decide.

Another attempt to have a baseball game will be made at Medford on Friday afternoon, Grants Pass high's nine journeying to this city. The two contests scheduled with Klamath Falls had to be canceled on account of wet grounds and the local team has had to satisfy themselves with a couple of practice games.

CHAUNCEY DEPEW GIVES VIEWS ON LIFE PHILOSOPHY

NEW YORK, April 23.—Chauncey M. Depew, chairman of the board of directors of the New York Central railroad and former United States senator from New York, planned to celebrate his 91st birthday today, he announced "by plunging away at his job," entertaining a few old cronies at dinner tonight, and leaving "providence to worry about the number of years he will live above 100."

He told reporters thirty cigars a day, he used to smoke, drank a quart of champagne daily and ate heartily of red meat, but has broken all of these habits. Ten minutes spent on "daily doze," constitutes his only exercise. He never played golf, tennis nor baseball in his life.

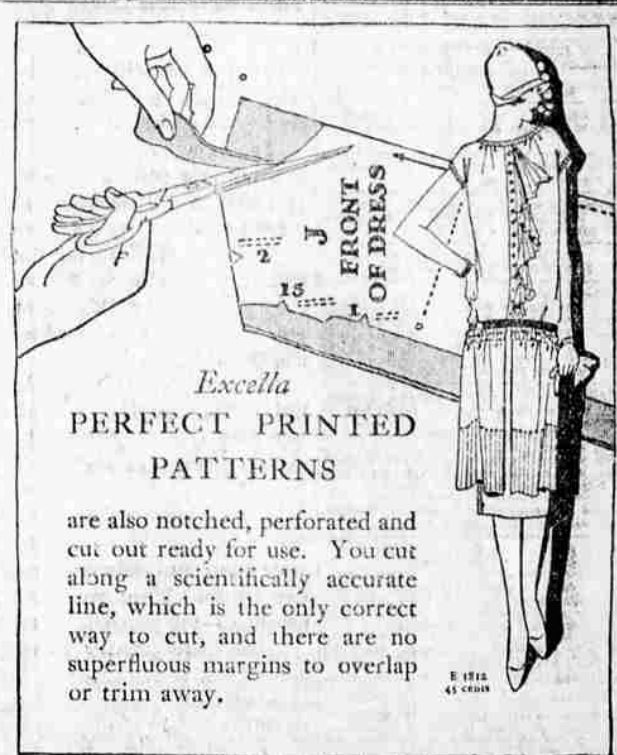

Sees Disaster if Farm Relief Is Not Given Soon

NEW YORK, April 23.—A disastrous increase in the cost of living was predicted here by Frank O. Lowden, former governor of Illinois, unless aid is given the farmers in organizing for the co-operative marketing of their products.

The former governor, speaking last night at the annual dinner of the Bureau of Advertising of the American Newspaper Publishers' association, said that American agriculture was decaying, that farm bankruptcies had increased 600 per cent in recent years and that farms are being abandoned in increasing numbers all over the country.

Rutton, teacher at Dixie school, six miles west of this city, was seriously injured this morning when the car in which she was riding with her son struck the car driven by Chris Egan.
