ALL READY FOR BIG FIELD DAY HERE SATURDAY

The 11th annual Jackson county school track and field meet will be held at the fairgrounds Saturday, and under the direction of John Peterson, will last all day. Ten rural and ten town schools will be entered in the contests and in the neighborhood of 200 boys and girls will participate.

The towns represented and their school colors, are as follows: Appleton, green; Butte Falls, black; Central Point, red; Gold Hill, white; Jacksonville, pink; Phoenix, blue; Prospect, brown; Rogue River, yellow; Sams Valley, grey; Talent, orange and Eagle Point, purple.

The events are divided into three classes, for boys and girls. "A" class is for boys and girls 12 years old or under; "B" class for boys and girls 13 to 15 years of age; "C" class, boys and girls, 16 to 21 years of age.

The events are as follows: Play-ground baseball and volleyball ball games, 50-yard dash, 100-yard dash, 120 yard hurdle, pole vault, 80-yard hurdle, throwing baseball, running high jump, hop, skip and jump, potato sack race, chinning, 220-yard dash, 880-yard run, shot put, discus throw and javelin throw, 440-yard relay race, 220-yard relay race.

The chief trophy is a cup given by the Jackson County Athletic association, to be won the first time this year. The Olympic cup, contested for by the teams last year, passed into the possession of Central Point, they having won it three times.

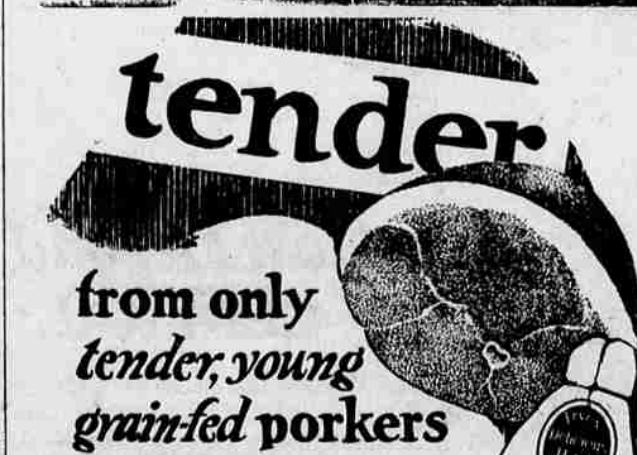

RUSSIANS POUR INTO CHINA AND BECOME CITIZENS

SEATTLE, April 23.—China is being invaded by hundreds of Russians who are taking out Chinese citizenship papers, today declared Rev. Daniel McGillicuddy, Catholic missionary from Kanchow, Province of Kiangsi, who arrived here yesterday on the steamship President Madison from Shanghai.

"I believe that this invasion is for the purpose of aggrandizement and other nations should watch this movement to protect their interests in China," said Father McGillicuddy. The missionary was accompanied by Rev. E. T. Sheehan, director of a Catholic mission in the district of Kanchow. Both are to visit Philadelphia and then return to their stations in China.

W. H. GORE SUES WOOD CUTTERS FOR \$806

A suit was filed in the circuit court Thursday by W. H. Gore of this city against George and Carl Magrieter, sawmill operators of the Applegate district, for \$806.67. Gore charges that the Magrieters, without his knowledge or consent, cut 83,721 feet of pine and 11,818 feet of fir timber owned by him. He seeks the recovery of the value of the timber at the market price. The alleged trespass is listed as having occurred between June, 1923, and October, 1924.
