

ASHLAND TO HAVE LARGE DELEGATION AT ROGUE RIVER

ASHLAND, April 24.—Miss Grace H. Chamberlain has returned to Ashland from her southern California trip. She reports Miss Elizabeth Palmer as much improved. Miss Chamberlain appears on the program at the southern Oregon District Federation meeting next Saturday at Rogue River.

The meeting at Rogue River promises to be well attended and has a very interesting and helpful program. The local hostess club is expecting a large number and has planned for at least one hundred and fifty guests. Eight delegates and several others are planning to be present from Ashland.

The flag committee of the Mount Ashland Chapter of the D. A. R. has many achievements to its credit this year, not the least of which was the purchase of a neat and durable base for a beautiful silk flag, which the Burnside Post of G. A. R. had presented to the high school several years ago, but which could not be used because of having no base. Mr. Olsen had but recently recovered from an attack of flu and it is supposed that the heart attack was a result of that illness. Mr. Olsen was a retired seaman, having served thirty years in the U. S. Navy. He has been a resident of Ashland for the past 11 years. He is survived by one brother, J. E. Olsen and one sister, both of Ashland.

The death of Mrs. Ellen Carter Galey occurred at 8:30 Wednesday evening at her home at 129 Granite street, after an illness of a few months. Mrs. Galey returned to Ashland, with her daughter, Miss Isabel Galey, from California about ten months ago. She was born in Elkhart, Iowa, May 18, 1852 and was married to Smith Bernard Galey at Elkhart in 1875. After living in Nebraska, and later in California, he family came to Ashland in 1884, since which time Ashland has been her family home with the exception of intervals when the home was made in Portland and Los Angeles.

Mrs. Galey was one of the pioneer members of the First Congregational church; had been active in the work of the church, Sunday school, and the Women's Christian Temperance Union. Mrs. Galey is survived by three children: Mabel C., Clarence L., and Henry C. Galey. A sister, Mrs. Orna Purdy of Houston, Texas, and two brothers, Ernest V. and Ray A. Carter also survive. Mr. S. B. Galey, the husband and father, died in May, 1892, at Ashland. One son, Ernest, and a daughter, Mabel, passed on some time ago. The funeral services will be held at the First Congregational church Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.
