School District Bond Election Notice, for School District No. 49, of Jackson County, Oregon.

State of Oregon, County of Jackson, School District No. 49.

Notice is hereby given, that at the school district bond election hereby called to be held at the High School building, in Medford, Jackson County, Oregon, on May 6th, 1925, in and for said school district, between the hours of two o'clock p. m. and seven o'clock p. m., of said date, there will be submitted to the legal voters of said school district No. 49, the question of contracting a bonded indebtedness in the sum of One Hundred Eighty-five Thousand (\$185,000.00) Dollars, and to issue its negotiable coupon bonds in said sum bearing interest at the rate of five per cent per annum, for the purpose of constructing and equipping a high school, or a unit thereof, and for said district, and to purchase the real property necessary for said purpose.
