**WOMEN'S RIGHTS CLUB
DISBANDS, WORK DONE**

WASHINGTON, April 24.—The National Women Suffrage association has formally ended its life of nearly 75 years devoted to the fight to obtain the vote for women. Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, president, presided at a meeting of its officers and other suffrage leaders called here yesterday for the formal disbanding of the organization through which Susan B. Anthony and other suffrage pioneers started before the civil war, that movement which achieved its goal with the adoption of the nineteenth amendment five years ago.

SEARCHLIGHTS AND AIRPLANES LOOK FOR FLEET

HONOLULU, April 24.—(By the Associated Press.)—Throughout last night searchlights stabbed the tropical sky over the island of Oahu, searching for planes of the blue fleet which is attacking the island in the war game now being held in the Pacific. There is a tense feeling of suspense evident everywhere among the defending black forces as the impending invasion of the island drew one day nearer.

Persistent rumors that the blue attacking forces have established an aircraft base on the island of Kauai with which communication has been cut off are evidently taken seriously by the defending black forces, which kept the heavens illuminated throughout the night by searchlights in an effort to prevent bombing of the island's defenses by a possible air raid of the invaders. For the first time in history a major-general commanding a beleaguered garrison, last night broadcast his precarious position by radio to all America, when Major General E. M. Lewis, commanding the Hawaiian department, spoke over broadcasting station KGU. General Lewis told of his position and explained details of the war game.

Can't Form a Cabinet.
BRUSSELS, April 24.—(By the Associated Press.)—Emile Vandervelde, the socialist leader, today informed King Albert that he found it impossible to fulfill the mission entrusted him of forming a cabinet to succeed that of Premier Theunis, which resigned April 5.
