

BICYCLE PARADE STARTS TOMORROW, MAYOR TO LEAD

Bicycle riders will assemble at South Bartlett and Main streets between the hours of 9:30 and 10 tomorrow. The parade will move up Main under escort of special police on motorcycles, led by the mayor or a councilman, to the Washington school grounds, where the safety first demonstration and awarding of prizes will take place. Chief Adams has assured John Rodda who has the parade in charge, that he will furnish officers enough to make the parade absolutely safe for the youngest riders, so that parents may have no hesitancy to let the youngest rider participate.

At the Washington school grounds John Rodda, western representative of the Cycle Trades of America, New York City, will show on his bicycle the right and wrong way to ride, and also give a lesson on road deportment which will enable any rider to go through traffic safely.

Scout Executive Cook has co-operated in working up enthusiasm among the Boy Scout troops, for which three prizes are offered for nearest appearance.

John Rodda was granted permission to speak in the schools by Superintendent Aubrey Smith, and he states the rivalry is keen among the students to secure the Cycle Trades of America trophy cup, which will be awarded on the percentage basis. All that is necessary is to be on hand with your bicycle and raise your hand when your school is called.
